

PS VCCA Board Meeting April 11, 2018, IHOP, Issaquah, WA

Meeting was called to order at 7:00 pm by Al Howe, Director.

Present: David Haddock, historian/activites, Bill Damm, club store, Diane Haddock, secretary and Jim Seiber.

Topics Discussed:

Meeting Locations: A new location for the monthly meeting must be found for next year, with tentative plans to return to Tillicum Middle School in September 2019. Diane Haddock presented a map of the Seattle area with push pins for members who attend meetings most frequently. Google Maps with routes for the northmost and southmost members showed travel times to Southcenter. The group discussed traffic on 405 and I5 which causes travel time for the north group to be much longer timewise than for the southern group, even though travel distance is longer than the southern group. It seems this supports use of Bellevue as a meeting location. Costs of meeting rooms in Bellevue area are a problem. There was also discussion about moving meeting times to afternoons, or to weekends. It was decided to discuss at the April meeting with members.

<u>Open Positions:</u> The Region will be needing replacements for the <u>Webmaster and Tappet Clatter Editor</u> starting this summer. There was a long discussion about how to fill these positions.

Editor: Dave and Diane Haddock offered to take over the Tappet Clatter editorial position – with the stipulation that another member come forward to fill in when they are out of town and unable to do the work. The other alternative would be to suspend publication when they were unable to edit. During those months, information that was determined to be important (by the Director or other members of the Board) would be sent out via group email to the membership. Al will also encourage members to submit stories for the Tappett Clatter.

<u>Webmaster</u>: No one present at the meeting had enough technical knowledge to know exactly what capabilities are needed to perform this function. The board identified several members who could provide guidance on the matter and/or take on some/all of the duties of the webmaster. Al Howe will contact these members to determine a course of action.

At the April meeting, Al Howe will ask for volunteers to:

Fill in for Diane and Dave on the Tappett Clatter when they are gone Take over the webmaster position, or some part of it with another member

<u>Banquet</u>: Jim Seiber and Diane Haddock have both been scouting locations for the 2019 Banquet. Both feel that the Renton VoTech would be a great location. Alcoholic beverage consumption is the biggest issue with this location. Price tolerance of the membership is also a question. Over the next several months, Jim and Diane will continue to work to find a banquet location.

Meeting was adjourned approximately 8:15 pm.

<u>Call to Order</u>: The meeting was called to order at Ringdall Middle School, by Al Howe at 7:30 pm sharp. There were 23 members in attendance.

The pictures tend to wash out. Overcast days can be good. Unusual angles can create interesting pictures. Jim uses tall ladders for a bird's eye view or getting low shots by placing the camera near the ground. (Note: Tall ladders may be hazardous to your health! An ER doctor who is close to some club members has cautioned against climbing ladders after the age of 50.*)

"Brakes Not as Good as They Could Be?

The following can make the difference between having brakes on your 20's car and NOT having brakes, or put another way, the difference between life and death. I do not know the years of cars that this article might apply to, but at least the 1920's and 30's.

Pre-1928 4 cylinder cars had only two-wheel brakes on the rear only. They started to include four-wheel brakes in 1928 on Chevrolets. The primary braking on today's cars is provided by the front brakes, so it is very important to do what we can to improve the brakes on these cars, especially the pre-1928 cars that have only rear brakes.

We will work our way through the brake system starting with the brake pedal. It is very important that the brake pedal not reach the floor during extreme braking, as that limits the amount of pressure that can be applied to the brakes. The next place to pay attention to is where the brake rods from the pedal reach the rear axle and the arm (brake adjuster arm) that the rod is attached to. The maximum brake application pressure is when the brake adjuster is at 90 degrees to the brake rod. To accomplish this the brake adjuster arm must be tilted back when the brake pedal is all the way out. Now we will consider the brake shoes. The metal brake shoes may not be contoured to the drum. If not contoured to the drum, braking will not take place on the entire brake lining surface, hence poor braking. Contouring the brake shoes to the drum can generally be done by hand. Once this is done, the metal shoes should be lined with a soft or high-friction woven lining material riveted to the metal shoe. Be cautious as some shops will line the metal shoes with hard lining if they are not familiar with these old cars. Hard lining will not stop your car.

Some people believe that bonding the woven lining to the metal shoes can cause the lining to harden and potentially soften the metal band as heat is applied in this process. A hardened lining will have a smaller coefficient of friction---- less stopping power. The safe way may be to attach the lining with rivets.

Several enthusiasts have found that brake shoes lined with today's hard brake lining are a death sentence. One person removed his car from his garage to test the brakes after a shop had put new lining on. The brakes would not stop his car going down his hill. He had to use the hand brake to stop it. His brakes had been lined with hard lining. Brake lining was originally attached with rivets and this is still the recommended method. Woven linings come in various thicknesses, but the common thickness being used is 3/16th inch. It will be difficult to adjust the brakes so they do not rub if the lining is too thick. The shop used woven brake lining from industrial equipment on my car and it was too thick, so the shop ground down the lining.

Woven or braided brake lining material is available at some tractor supply stores, from McMaster-Carr (http://www.mcmaster.com/#friction-material/=rmj4h1) and from Bob's Automobilia, 805 434-2963, www.bobsautomobilia.com. Rivets are available from Hanson Rivet and Supply Co., 13241 Weidner Street, Pacoima, CA 91331, www.hansonrivet.com, 818 485-0500.

There is also an excellent brake lining discussion on VCCA Chat at "https://vccachat.org/ubbthreads.php/ubb/showflat/Number/304731."

The next spot to be concerned about is the brake shoe setup. This requires a close look at a manual to be certain it is set up properly and adjusted properly. Proper set up can be the difference between brakes working or not.

Directions to Ringdall/Tillicum Middle School 11650 SE 60th St, Bellevue

Traveling 405 from either the north or south, take exit 10 and head east to 119th St (should be the first stop light east of 405). From I-90 take the 405 South Exit and immediately stay to the right, getting off at the Coal Creek Parkway exit. (Note: you'll never actually merge onto 405.) Turn left under the freeway and take a right at the light on 119th. Go up the hill, passing through a couple of stop signs and turn right on SE 60th. The shopping center will be on your left. Follow SE 60th and Ringdall will be on your right. The meeting place for monthly PSVCCA meetings will be at Tillicum/Ringdall School Library (not the cafeteria).
