We wash our hands frequently and do not touch our faces. We disinfect our homes and everything that comes into our homes that could be carrying "live" virus cells in miniscule droplets. Yes, studies show these cells can survive hours on paper and cardboard and days on plastic and metal surfaces. When I was a young driver, I became suddenly popular. I had a car, a very reliable 1947 Chevrolet sedan AKA my '47 Corvette. It was the vehicle that got me and some of my classmates from Raymond to Aberdeen where Grays Harbor College was located every weekday. The trip was about 20 miles one way. We frequently had to stay later than other Raymondites, being we were "starring" in evening play performances. The road we traveled, known as the Aberdeen Highway, was not heavily traveled after dark. The road had its daytime hazards and risks, logging trucks, slides, and deer on the road. There were a few curves that required slowing to navigate. At night this drive could be considered treacherous. There were also a few straight stretches. The '47 was no candidate for setting a speed limit record; however, I was able to manage an economy run, using less than a gallon of gas, by shutting off the engine and coasting the downhill stretches.

Recent health news related to the Covid-19 virus reminds me of one stunt (a stupid stunt I've been told) I pulled occasionally. I was inspired to turn off the headlights on a full moonlit night. 
April Meeting??

Puget Sound Region VCCA Secretary Report – March 2020

Due to the Covid-19 virus, the March Meeting was cancelled. Director Jim Seiber called to order a virtual board meeting to discuss both the Dave Gowan Memorial Tour that had been planned for May and the 2020 Northwest Meet that was planned for July 2020. The decision was made to cancel the May tour.

It was decided that Don Comstock would look into the timeline for possible cancellation of the NW Meet and the costs of cancelling. Postponement to September was also discussed. Most members of the board felt that September would not work because of traditional activities in Ellensburg that month and concern that attendance would be low. After Don Comstock reported the costs of cancelling the meet, it was determined that it would be best to make a decision soon, to minimize our costs. Jim Seiber sent an email to Puget Sound Region Members. His email included a report from Don Comstock, Meet Chair, which included a detailed discussion of the points that should be considered when making a decision whether to cancel the meet. Don also provided information about the costs of cancellation at various points of the timeline. Members were asked to vote to cancel/not cancel.

Director Jim Seiber summarized:

Due to circumstances beyond our control, the Board has voted to cancel the NW Meet in Ellensburg July 2020. Twenty members voted to cancel the Meet, largely due to health concerns and the uncertainty created by the Covid-19 virus. We will be exploring options for future tours, after we have a better understanding of the risks involved. Thanks to those of you who participated in this decision-making process. We are appreciative of those who invested hours in planning and preparation. Registration materials and checks will be returned. Remember to cancel your motel reservation.

While not all members voted, the vote was unanimous to cancel the Meet. As secretary, I recorded votes by household because some households provided two votes and some only one. For consistency, only one vote per household was recorded. Votes to cancel were received from 22 households. Many expressed thanks to those who have spent so much time planning for the meet and hopes that it can be rescheduled for next year in Ellensburg. Comments also included grave concerns for the safety of attendees, sadness that the event cannot be safely held.

Webmaster Ralf Luche has removed the registration form and the prospectus and posted a notice of the cancellation on the website.
