
showed us her hobby of painting rocks and putting together other decorative items for display. Our last part of the visit included Annette serving us a fresh-baked cherry pie, that we found she had

Two sets of real sharp darts, For bully brothers Mark and Joe. They would throw them at each other, Sure to get hurt, (Santa) "yes I know".


Just a lump of coal For naughty boy named Matt. That's all he gets for Christmas For being such a brat.

My Final Notes as your Glove Box Coordinator

GPS to 6 Volt Systems

Al Howe has reported successfully connecting his GPS to the 6 Volt system in his '27 Chevrolet. This could be a great advantage on some of our tours.

Tubes in Radial Tires

It is evidently not unusual for old wheels to leak if radial tires are used. Coker Tire weighs in; "Tubeless tires are pretty straightforward. In most cases you can mount them to the wheel, air them up, and they will remain inflated, unless there is damage to the tire or wheel. With that said, buying a tubeless tire does not mean that you CAN'T use a tube. It simply means that the bead is designed to seal against the rim without the use of a Tube", (www.cokertire.com/blog/tube-tech).
