### Snow Adventures in the '40

As this week's snow happened, I thought I could write about my winter adventures driving over Snoqualmie Pass on US Highway 10, the Sunset Highway, in my '40 Chev between 1967 to 1970. I was working as an Electrical Engineer at the N-Reactor on the Hanford Project. I drove many times between Richland and Seattle, sometimes almost every weekend. I had chosen to keep and maintain my '40 business coupe instead of buying a '60s muscle car as many of my peers were doing. By that time I had become attached to my '40 and enjoyed having a vintage form of transportation. I had purchased the car from Ida Ruppert, my mother's longtime friend, in 1962 with about 63,000 miles on the odometer.

I had the 216 engine rebuilt in June of 1967 just before I headed to Hanford. (This engine is now on display in my garage and was taken apart, mic'ed and put back together in record time by Dave Folsom at a Garage nite in June 2012.)

On one of my snow trips over the pass, the snow was filling the sky. By the time I reached the pass after leaving work, it was dark and no westbound cars to follow. My windshield wipers couldn't keep up with the

snow and my view through the windshield became smaller and smaller. I would then roll down the window and use my long-handled squeegee to clear the window.






**Snow Adventures** (continued from p.1)



This was a cold operation and the inside of the car took a while to warm up with my homemade heater. I needed to drive with low beam headlamps to minimize the reflection from the snow-filled air. Somewhere after the Easton hill the old four lane Highway 10 split into westbound and eastbound highways. All of the guard rails were covered by snowplowed snow and where the two roadways split apart, the snow plows had left a wedge of snow sever-



al feet high. As I traveled westward, Î came to this place and with the limited visibility I couldn't tell where the boundaries of the highway were. Suddenly I was heading straight for this wedge of snow. In the snowy darkness, it looked like the bow of the Titanic!

I was traveling at a slow speed but there was not enough time or traction to change course. I made a direct hit on the point of the snow and came to a stop. I got out and surveyed the result. No damage to the front, but when I opened the hood, the space between the grille and radiator was jam packed with snow. It was a cold job removing the snow by hand. I thought if I left it in, I would not have cooling and overheat the engine climbing the pass. The rest of the trip was slow but uneventful and I was glad to arrive at my parents' home in Seattle, out of the weather.

The '40 was my daily driver

until 1981 when it was parked in our garage, 185,686 miles on the odometer. At the encouragement of my son, Andrew, we started its restoration in 1999. Today it has 198,308 miles on the odometer. We always have a lot of fun taking it for a drive, when it's not snowing!
