We have just enjoyed two VCCA events in our '40: the Ballard Parade and the 47th NW Meet in Chehalis. Our Chevy has been in the "family" since 1962 when I bought it to commute to the U/W from a longtime friend of my mom's. I have always enjoyed driving it, even when it required special maintenance. This was the case going to the NW Meet when the 13 year old inner tubes reached the end of their life. Fortunately we were traveling with folks from the North Cascades who got us back on the road. Thanks to Gene Rogers and Doug Meek! The next morning when the second rear tire went flat at the hotel and

was discovered and taken by Steve Kassis to Les Schwab for repair, we decided to have all of the inner tubes replaced.

I have 198,031 miles on the Chevy. 12,334 miles of that have been driven since it was restored in 2005. It had between 63,000 and 65,000 miles on it when I purchased it in 1962. I drove it as a daily driver from Seattle to Richland, California, Oregon and around the NW until 1981. I parked it with 185,697 miles on the odometer for it to wait for restoration. On these two recent VCCA events, 400 miles were added to the Chevy along with more of our smiles.

From the South: Take SR 520 east; freeway becomes Avondale Road in Redmond. In about 5 miles on Avondale RD turn right onto NE 159th Street, go about 2 blocks and turn left onto 195th Place NE. Go to the end of the drive and park on left in front of the pole barn or right in front of the shop.

Shoot Your Chevy!

Think about the many tools you need to work on your car; one of the most useful is a camera. Your photos will document the condition of your car before and after restoration. They keep a record of part placement before disassembly, so the images can be referred to in the assembly process. When the restoration is complete and the car is on the road, show it off! A camera records where you have driven, what you have done. Your car is a work of art, a unique auto that deserves the best possible pictures.

What photography skills would help you take the best pictures of your car? What are some things to avoid when taking pictures of your car? I would like to share a few tips that are generally accepted guidelines for good photography.

- The most important element in photography is light. If there is too little light, there is nothing to see. If there is too much light, you see only white. The ideal light for photographing a car is on an overcast day, when the clouds filter the bright sunlight. Another time to "shoot" is early morning just after sunrise, or in the evening just before sunset. Avoid shooting at midday in bright sunlight, as this creates really bright areas and really dark areas, so that some part of the scene will be lost. When on a tour it is seldom possible to wait for an overcast sky or a low sun angle; all you can do is try to reduce the effects of poor lighting.
- Is the light even throughout the scene? If part of the car is in the shade it will be hard to see in comparison to bright sun on the rest of the car. Bright spots add distractions and cover detail. Note the direction of the light where are the shadows? Do shadows darken an important part of the image?
- Ask yourself, what am I photographing? If you want to photograph the entire car, you need to position yourself to show as much of the car as possible. Look around the car. Are there any distracting objects in the picture frame? (For example Does a white garbage can in the background help the picture?) Find a way to position your camera to show what you want the viewer to see. An old house or building may complement the image of your car nicely, but you may not want to include a reflection of your mother in a back window. Some reflections, however, may add to the image. A good background scene is as important as the car; it should help tell a story.
- If you are photographing car parts or restoration detail, shoot only that piece. Lay the part on a solid color towel or blanket. Move it outside for good light. If the part or area you want to photograph is attached to the car, try to isolate the part so it is all that shows.

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Is the car the same color as the background? Move it. A black car against a black building or dark shadow will make it hard to see the edges of the car.

• If you want to submit a photo for a G&D cover, take some vertical images. Since the car is a horizontal object, that leaves a lot of space above it that needs to be filled. Look for an interesting taller object, and get the camera low to the ground. A tree, a sign, a barn, an old house, and a landscape feature will work well to fill the space above the car. Some sky showing at the top of the frame is okay.

Look for a natural frame for the car; shoot through an arch of trees or a building.

- Read your camera instruction book! Know how to set your camera to get the highest quality picture possible for the situation.
- Don't be afraid to try different angles to view the car! Photograph from below headlight level or from a ladder or a second story window. Experiment!
- To get sharp, in-focus pictures, hold the camera still when pressing the shutter release; use a tripod, a ladder, a chair, or any solid object to hold the camera steady.

If taking digital images, be sure you have a high resolution picture. If you are sending prints for publication, be sure they are sharp and color is correct. See the February 2012 G&D or http://vcca.org/guidelines.htm for specific guidelines.

Don't be afraid to experiment with your camera as a tool to help share your great Chevy tale. There are very few "perfect" pictures - the idea is to continue to *plan* to improve the quality of your photos in order to better share the beauty of your old Chevy. Do you like the pictures you have taken? Do the pictures help tell part of the story? Would you hang these images on your wall? Pick a time, place, camera, and go shoot your Chevy!
