A Magical Trip to Fairbanks

Although Bob was skeptical after we failed to see the Northern Lights in Iceland, I decided to book a trip to Fairbanks for mid-March, which is statistically the best time to view them. Experts say if you stay for 3 nights, you should see the lights at least 1 of those nights. Not wanting to be disappointed again, I booked our stay for 6 nights, and we were treated to the lights for all 6! What a fantastic way to fulfill my dream! We highly recommend the **Alaska Grizzly Lodge** just north of town. No waiting out in the cold for hours like we did in Iceland! Janet, one of the owners, wakes you up when the lights appear. All we needed to do was pull our coats, boots, gloves, and hats over our PJ's and hurry to the deck she directed us to. Each morning we were treated to a delicious breakfast made by her husband, Fred. We enjoyed visiting with the other travelers who were fulfilling their dreams too.

We found Fairbanks had even more to offer. The antique car collection at the **Fountainhead Antique Auto Museum** contains over 100 vehicles, each carefully selected for its historical significance, technological innovations, or rarity. Several of Alaska's earliest cars are on display, including the Territory's very first automobile, hand built in 1905 by a man who had never seen a car before! While displaying only one Chevy, a 1923, the Museum is the only place where you can see 8 unique, expensive orphan cars. From mid-September to mid-May, the museum is only open from 12-4 on Sundays and Wednesdays, but staffed with very knowledgeable volunteers. Their pay is to get to drive the cars (all but 3 are operable). We didn't expect to be fascinated, but we were.

We, also, visited the **University of Alaska Museum of the North**, which is open all year. We were lucky to view the **World Ice Art Championships**, which take place from late February to March each year, and watch the **Open North American Championship Sled Dog Race**, which is another annual event taking place in mid-March and is known as the "granddaddy of all sprint dog races."

We believe other Club members would love this trip, too! I may even need a return trip!



MONROE SWAP MEET HAS COME AND GONE

Why restore Leque Island?

Prior to being diked in the late 1800's, Leque Island was part of the Stillaguamish estuary connecting Skagit Bay to Port Susan Bay. Estuary habitat plays a critical role in young chinook salmon growth and in the life cycle of many other aquatic and bird species. However, only 15% of historic Stillaguamish estuary currently remains intact.

In October 2019, the dikes were removed and Leque Island was returned to the estuary. This site works in tandem with nearby restoration projects, like the Stillaguamish Tribe's zis a ba* project and The Nature Conservancy's Port Susan Bay project. Together, these restoration sites provide places for salmon to grow before entering the ocean, increasing their likelihood of survival.

Excavated over 5 miles of new channels and created several lower depressions for fish and bird habitat.

Constructed new 0.7-mile berm to protect the City of Stanwood from waves.

Built a walking trail on top of berm.

Built new parking area and non-motorized boat launch.

Recreation features were suggested by local community members, including the pooled areas that hold water for fish and birds. Thanks to an involved community, WDFW was able to include these suggested features into the project.



Installing LED Lights For Safety

Safety is a major concern when driving our vintage & classic cars on today's highways. Original tail lights are not easily seen and todayâs drivers expect to see bright tail lights to warn them of stop & turning intentions of our vintage vehicles. This becomes especially important with night driving.

Original vehicles move slower on the road than their modern counterparts. Having LED tail lights on the rear of our vintage cars helps other drivers see us quicker than with standard tail lights. This is helpful even in daylight hours.

LED (Light Emitting Diode) lighting has become the standard of the automotive industry and for good reason. It is bright and easy to see! Newly designed LED conversions are available in 6 volt or 12 volt, depending on application. They are made for most applications of vintage Chevrolet & GMC cars & trucks.

This is a safety item you can't afford to be without! Whether you have a totally original early 4 or 6-cylinder with a 6-volt system or a modern monster V-8 running a 12-volt system, these are a must-have addition to your vintage car or truck.

There are four different ways to convert your vintage car from the old incandescent bulbs to super bright LED lighting: LED Light Bulbs, Conversion LED Cards, Solid State LED Lenses or Complete LED Tail Light Assemblies.



Bulbs are a simple and inexpensive plug & play solution. You merely remove the old bulb and install a new LED bulb. Though this is a quick way it is the least effective solution to the problem. The draw back to the bulb solution is that the size and number of LEDs that can fit into a bulb is considerably less than the conversion cards, solid state lenses or LED tail light assemblies. This makes the LED Light Bulbs the least visible of the four options. While this is an economical solution it is just not as effective as the other options. Most LED Light bulbs are only available for 12 volt applications.

LED Conversion Cards are available for most tail lights from 1926 through 1965 passenger cars and 1926 through 1987 trucks. These kits have two LED circuit cards and hardware for both tail lights. Early kits: 1926-1936 passenger and 1931-1939 truck are available in single or two taillight packages. Most kits are sold in pairs and come with the license light for the left side assembly. Also included are fasteners, hardware and instructions needed to install the card into the tail light bucket. They will work with turn signal, taillight and stop light circuits. These kits are available in 6 volt for most applications for 1954 and earlier and 12 volt for all years. These cards cover most of the surface area of the tail light lens and are far more visible than just replacing the light bulb with an LED bulb. Additionally, LEDs do not create heat like incandescent bulbs and are therefore safe when used with plastic lenses.

Solid State LED Lenses are a complete âplug & playâ solution. Each lens has LEDs permanently sealed into the lens. There are no separate cards to install. Most kits have plugs already attached that merely need to be twisted into the original sockets for installation. Some must have wires manually attached, which is a simple process. Solid State LED Lenses are currently only available in 12 volt applications. However, these are a quick and easy upgrade for a huge increase in safety. Recently added to this category are the **Sequential LED Tail Light Lenses.** These lenses are LED but they flash sequentially to indicate the direction of the turn. This latest improvement adds an extra level of safety and individuality. Make your car or truck stand out with this fantastic upgrade! Available in 12-volt for 1937-1938 passenger cars & 1940-1953 trucks; 1967-1972 Fleetside trucks; 1973-1987 Fleetside trucks.

LED Tail Light Assemblies offer a complete solution for those street rod or original applications requiring complete replacement tail lights. A large number of complete assemblies come in stock appearing housings and also flush mounted units for Street Rod applications. Stock units look like the originals and mount like the originals, except that they will have LED lenses. Flush mounted units have no housing, just a tail light rim (bezel) and LED lens ready for mounting on any flat surface. Complete units are only available for 12 volt systems.

The most recent of these complete tail light assemblies to become available are the 1933-1934 passenger car and 1935 Standard passenger car tail lights. In addition to LED tail lights, parking light LED solid state lenses and amber bulb LEDs are available for many car & truck 12 volt applications. One thing to note with LED lighting is that it has very little current draw on the electrical system. For this reason, if you run LEDs on the front and rear of your vintage vehicle, it will require an electronic flasher to operate the turn signals. Whether you are driving your vintage car or truck on a cross country trip or just a 50 mile tour with your local car club, the safety of LED tail lights will pay for itself many times over. You have probably already seen others that have made the LED conversion to their vintage vehicle. Next time you get the opportunity, follow one of them for a short distance. We guarantee you will be impressed with these bright, high visibility tail lights. They are a must-have item for your old car or truck!Related items: LED Bulbs, LED Conversion Kits, LED Tail Light Lenses, LED Complete & Flush Mounted Tail Light Assemblies, Sequential LED Tail Light Lenses, LED Parking Light Lenses, Electronic Turn Signal Flashers.
