DICK AND FRAN OLSON

I thought I would reflect on forty-three years in the VCCA. With raising three kids and being self-employed in the appliance service business, it kept Fran and me very busy. Trying to find time and money for old cars was always a challenge. In 1973 I bought a 1936 Chevrolet pickup with a cracked block for \$50; I beat the junkman to it by one day. I acquired a '49 dump truck engine in Cle Elum and my son and I got it together so he could drive it up and down the driveway. I put a want-ad in a local hot rod magazine looking for fenders. Jim Seiber called me and talked me into joining the PSVCCA. The club was family oriented so I needed a family car. At one of the club outings we were at Hollywood Schoolhouse in Woodinville and Fran was talking with fellow member Scott Woodley, who said he had a 1950 two-door for sale. I ended up dragging that home. The engine was rebuilt but seized. I got it running in time to load the kids in for the trip to the NW Meet in Port Angeles. I did body work on that car in my woodshed. Fran and I painted it in the carport. There are lots of family memories of VCCA trips in that car, including the National Meet in Santa Rosa, CA.

When my son, Tim, was in high school I purchased a 1957 half-ton pickup with a six-cylinder engine. We installed a V8 with overdrive and started doing body work. Tim drove it to school with primer spots. For his senior year we had it painted bright red with white-spoked wheels. It was a big hit at Issaquah High.

In 1984, I purchased a 1950 convertible from a service customer in North Bend. They had let it sit in their leaky carport. It had a cracked block, torn top and broken glass. I drove it home, which was a step up from my previous purchases. 1985 we were busy with a house remodel and building my dream four car garage. After getting my shop set up I started a five-year, body-off restoration. The first time out was the 1990 NW Meet at Bremerton. We have driven the '50 convertible to National Meets in Rapid City, SD. and Grand Junction, CO. Also, to many NW Meets and one All-Cal Meet.

February 26, 2018

Call to Order: The meeting was called to order at Ringdall Middle School at 7:30 by Director Al Howe.

<u>Welcome</u>: 25 members were in attendance. Al read a Thank You letter from Area 3 Director Dave Gowan for the good time and free meal at our banquet in January.

Secretary: Minutes accepted as printed in Tappet Clatter.

<u>Treasurer</u>: Sallie reported all bills have been paid including our national dues, banquet expenses, and \$500 donated to the Northwest Meet. We sold \$110 in decals leaving our treasury in good order.

Membership: Donna Onat mailed out the 2018 rosters to members unable to claim them in person.

<u>National News</u>: Bill Barker let us know the National is soliciting for members to work on the 2021 National Meet in Bowling Green Kentucky. We are also looking for volunteers to work on the 2020 meet. Also, the VCCA website is having a few problems as predicted.

Glove Box: Bob Stamnes added information on batteries to his article in the TC. Optima batteries solved problems for some because it has higher cranking capacity which prolongs the life of the battery. He also shared his newly spoked wood wheel with us.

Activities: March 17 and 18 is the Almost Spring Swap Meet in Puyallup. Don Comstock suggested we bring a few cars to show as they give us a spot to promote our club. Ken Scott and Don Comstock will bring cars but there wasn't interest in staffing a booth. Don also asked for tour ideas for March; none were forthcoming. May is busy with the HCCA breakfast and tour in Puyallup and ending at the LeMay Museum. (unknown as to which one) on the 6th, the Ballard Parade on the 17th and the Monroe Swap Meet the 18th to 20th. We need worker volunteers for the swap meet. Sign-up next month. Other: A regional theme basket for raffle at the NW Meet was suggested; Marilyn Campbell is handling it. She will let us know what she decides and needs. Stories or articles for the TC highlighting members are covered through June and September. Needed are writers for July, August, and October through December. Awards Banquet problems last month prompted Jim Seiber and Diane Haddock separately to look for a new location. After discussion we agreed to pursue Renton Vo-Tec. .2020 Meet— Members at the meeting settled on Moses Lake as a potential site for our next Northwest Meet and Jim Darby has agreed to chair the event. From the Glove Box

Hub (Wheel) Pullers (1920's on)

It is often necessary to pull the hubs off your car. This can be very difficult, if not impossible on your '25-'38 Chevy without a hub puller. I realized this early on and was fortunate to be able to borrow a 1920's hub puller from a VCCA member. Unfortunately, my restoration and need for the puller lasted way too long, which bothered me greatly. But I also felt desperate as I did not know how else to get the hub off. I finally realized that as long as I owned one of these old cars, I would need a puller too. Here are some ways to get your hands on one.

There are several ways to find or make a hub puller. You can find them on eBay but it took me many years to find one, and then only after purchasing the first one that had nothing to tighten it on the hub threads after screwing it on. I recently spent about \$50 for a '25 -'28 Chevrolet wheel puller on eBay (shown on next page). Now I need to get the borrowed puller back to its owner, Thanks Jim.

George McMurty, <u>www.customhubpullers.com</u>, 308-586-1930 also manufactures hub pullers for many different years of cars. This is a very fine tool, but the cost is over \$200 each. The instructions for this puller are attached to give you an idea of what you might be purchasing.

Other people have made their own pullers. See photos on next page. These two are similar in that they both attach to the lug bolts and have a larger bolt in the middle that can be tightened and hit with a hammer to put pressure on the hub to come off.

One is described as follows:

Attach modern lug nuts to the studs on the hub (wheel) with half of the thread on the nuts exposed. Using a thick piece of metal, drill holes so each a bolt can be put through the plate to connect to each lug nut. Then drill a hole in the center of the plate and thread it to receive a bolt that once all the lug bolts are tightened, can be tightened against the end of the axle to put pressure on the hub to come off. Hitting the center bolt with a hammer may be necessary to break the hub loose. Remember to loosen the brake bands so the hub can be pulled off. See pictures on next page.

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Then there is a cap that can be screwed onto the end of the axle and that you can pound on with a hammer to remove the hub (see photo below that has two such caps). I would expect this to take a harder hit as you have no tension on the hub to encourage it to come off as you do in the above procedures. Would this method ruin the gears in the rear end? According to Dave Folsom, the concern would be ruining the bearings that hold the axle in. Dave does not think it would hurt the rear end gears, but was hesitant to advise the use of this cap to remove a hub. Please give me some feedback, especially if you have used a cap like this successfully to remove your hubs(rstamnes@yahoo.com).



MORE ON BATTERIES

I received some feedback from last months Glove Box article on Batteries.

One was that an OPTIMA battery has worked for several years where he had gone through a normal lead acid battery every year before that. He also sent me to VCCA Chat, https://vccachat.org/ubbthreads.php/topics/403865/6v-batteries.html#Post403865, which discusses the characteristics of several batteries which I found very interesting. This site shows that OPTIMA has a higher Cold Cranking Amps and also higher Cranking Amps, which could be why they work better in some situations.

Purchased a 6 volt battery two years ago and it had a three year warranty. The battery failed two months ago....it had one dead cell. Took the battery back and with ...

Also received a comment on my statement that I was not changing to an OPTIMA Battery myself-- this should not be taken as a recommendation for normal lead acid batteries, but rather a statement of my situation where I have had no problems with the normal lead acid battery in my cars lately.

Really appreciate the feed back from Jim Lewis. Thanks Jim.

Directions to Ringdall/Tillicum Middle School

11650 SE 60th St, Bellevue

Traveling 405 from either the north or south, take exit 10 and head east to 119th St (should be the first stop light east of 405). From I-90 take the 405 South Exit and immediately stay to the right, getting off at the Coal Creek Parkway exit. (Note: you'll never actually merge onto 405.) Turn left under the freeway and take a right at the light on 119th. Go up the hill, passing through a couple of stop signs and turn right on SE 60th. The shopping center will be on your left. Follow SE 60th and Ringdall will be on your right. The meeting place for monthly PSVCCA meetings will be at Tillicum/Ringdall School Library (not the cafeteria).
