#### **TUESDAY COFFEE GANG**

For over 24 years, a small informal group of about 20+ auto enthusiasts have met at 6 am for breakfast and coffee at Denny's Restaurant at Kennydale Hill alongside I-405. They were mostly an eclectic group of owners of vintage cars such as Ford, Chevy, Rickenbacker, Chrysler, etc. There was no restriction as to who could attend, nor what they owned. During these years, over 400 guys attended and qualified for an unofficial "membership" card. Last year Washington State took adverse possession of the restaurant property for expanded carpool lanes and a new overpass on I-405. So Denny's closed its doors in December.

The group of guys then moved to the Plum Delicious Restaurant on Sunset Blvd (Renton). Unfortunately this only lasted for about 6 or 7 meetings until the Covid pandemic closed them down in early March. Since then a small subset of this group (mostly VCCA guys) has continued to surreptitiously meet on an ad hoc basis at different locations. These have been at the Egg & Us Restaurant in Issaquah, the XXX Restaurant (outside tables) and Olson and Barker's garages. Attendance has usually been only 4 or 5 guys. Some of them have even used this opportunity to drive vintage.

In August, Bill Barker hosted the "breakfast gang" for coffee and donuts at his garage. The meeting was not widely advertised since we don't want to violate any limits set by the State for group sizes. In spite of that, a new "record" of 7 folks showed up at the 8 am start time. These included Dick Olson, Jim Seiber, Jim Farris, Bob Helgeson, Roland Klix (Rickenbaker), Phil Howard (Ford) and myself. To my surprise Don Boltz even sent an email saying that he would have attended, but he needed to take Lynn's car in for an oil change. (He's got his priorities straight.)

Jim Farris (who hasn't attended any breakfasts over the past 10 or 11 months) says that he was up at 5:15 am so that he could take a shower. Said he didn't want to smell when seeing old friends once again. He arrived in Issaquah at 6:45 am by taking back streets through Seattle running the gauntlet since the West Seattle bridge is closed. He says that he appreciated that the seven guys in Bill's garage were well spaced, just talking, laughing and having a good time. We were all glad to see Jim and he said "It felt really good."

For the near future, we anticipate continuing to meet in or around Issaquah. We've recently heard from about 10 of the other guys that were meeting at Denny's and nearly every one of them has either had a medical issue or a mishap that prevents them from attending. So it appears that the original gang has come to a close and our smaller group is going to carry on the Tuesday morning coffee tradition. A further footnote to this event is that during the entire 24 years, the group had the same waitress at Denny's. She relocated to Plum Delicious when we did. But once the Covid restrictions were imposed, she decided to "finally" retire. Our "best wishes" go to Annie!

If you happen to be in Issaquah early on a Tuesday morning, and see a vintage car on Gilman Boulevard, you're welcome to follow it and join us for coffee. If the Governor questions you later about the group, then you're on your own. We don't issue membership cards nor make reservations. Maybe we should call ourselves the "Coincidental Gang" since our coffee meetings are purely coincidental. Sort of.... (See photos on p. 8)

**Nomination of Officers**: We need to name a nomination committee to open nominations for Club officers. Please let me know if you would be willing to serve.

**Dues**: Collection put on hold as we have a good cash balance in our bank account. The plan would be **not to collect** member dues for the 2021 year. Further decisions need to look at reduced rates for future years, but for the coming year, we do not collect dues.

**Roster**: No new Roster for 2021. We will request any information about changes for the Roster and updates, such as phone numbers, addresses, and cars owned. Each member will receive an updated Roster page to insert in the 2020 Roster so that all information is current for 2021.

**Zoom Membership Purchase**: Vote needed on this item for approval by the membership if future meetings will be scheduled as a ZOOM meeting with the purchase of a club Zoom membership. The Club cost of a year's subscription to ZOOM is \$149 which includes unlimited number of minutes per meeting. Diane Haddock has agreed to serve as "Host" if this item is approved. 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## Puget Sound Region VCCA Minutes Board Meeting 8-24-2020 via Zoom

Attending: Jim Seiber, Diane and Dave Haddock, Bill Barker, Sallie and Don Comstock, Al Howe, Rod and Evie Schein, Don Hatley, George Warren, Bob and MG Stamnes, Rod McCarthy, Ernie Tear, Dan Young, Gary Rogers

<u>Election of Officers</u>-Director Jim outlined the procedures for nominating officers as required in the By-Laws. A nominating committee needs to be appointed and he asked for suggestions for the committee. Current officers who have indicated willingness to continue serving in their positions: Sallie Comstock, treasurer, Donna Onat, membership. Don Hatley indicated he is stepping down from his Club Store position.

<u>Dues-</u> Sallie says the club currently has sufficient funds in bank. With very few expenditures, the club can financially remain solvent without collecting dues this year. A vote was asked for to suspend dues for one year. Discussion: suggestion offered for consideration of reduced dues for this year to go into a rainy day fund by Dave Haddock, suggestion offered for no dues this year and reduced dues for next year by Al Howe. Support voiced for eliminating dues for 2021 from Don Hatley, Rod McCarthy, Bob and MG Stamnes, Rod and Evie Schein, Diane Haddock. Bill Barker mentioned that many Regions collect no dues at all and there is no National VCCA requirement for regions to collect dues. Bob Stamnes asked if the zero dues would apply to new members joining the club. Board decided to cancel dues for this year. It will apply to current and new members for the coming year.

<u>Roster/Membership- Jim said the largest expenditure is the cost of the Roster. He suggested that for this year no new Roster be printed. Instead, updates and new members information can be sent electronically to members for adding to their 2020 Roster or an updates page could be printed and distributed. Clarification, this change is for 2021 only - requested and confirmed. Diane asked about the cost of printing the Roster. Perhaps new members should have a Roster fee that would cover the cost of printing a Roster. Rod Schein mentioned that Donna may have extra copies available for new members.</u>

<u>Future Meetings</u>- Jim talked to Jose yesterday. Jose indicated he does not know when he will be allowed to reopen the back room for meetings. Don Hatley suggested considering meeting outside, i.e., in a park. Jim said Carol Folsom has offered her place as somewhere to meet outside. A possible tour around Lake Sammamish was mentioned. Bob Stamnes asked what the procedure would be to communicate a mini-tour type activity to the membership. Al Howe was asked to write up a description for the Tappet Clatter. Diane mentioned that medical folks are saying the fall season brings the possibility of a double whammy from the flu and Covid-19 so meetings are still questionable activities.

<u>Area 3 Director's Report</u>- The other Regions are having the same issues as Puget Sound trying to meet, hold tours, etc. with the virus restrictions. Small mini-tours have been filling the void with members mostly remaining in their cars. The schedule for upcoming Northwest Meets: 2021, Willamette Region hosting in Newport OR; 2022, North Cascades Region hosting; 2023, Mt. Rainier Region hosting; 2024, Columbia River Region hosting; 2025, Puget Sound Region hosting. Puget Sound Region has offered to assist Mt. Rainier Region in 2023 if they wish to have assistance.

<u>Christmas Party/Banquet</u>- Discussion on these two traditional activities. Comstocks will not be hosting a Christmas Party this year. The banquet location may not be allowed to hold catered gatherings due to virus-related restrictions. Rod Schein said the train display usually held at their church will be a virtual event this year. Discussion on considering a virtual party event or several small events as possibilities.

Miscellaneous- Dave asked everyone to send him articles and photos for the Tappet Clatter. With no activities or meetings, he needs material for upcoming editions of the Tappet Clatter. Comments about the pleasure of having people attend the virtual meeting who are typically unable to be present at an in-person club meeting. Al asked about continuing the Zoom meetings in the future. Gary Rogers said he has a membership which costs about \$150 for the year. Diane will investigate the details of a Zoom membership for the club, costs, etc. A membership will allow meetings with 100 participants and unlimited number of meetings. Al moved to conduct meetings via Zoom. Bob seconded it. The motion was tabled until Diane has collected information.

#### The Case of the Missing Pound-Feet, or, How the Torque Monster Got Its Groove Back

In an earlier "What Are You Up To?" section of the *Vair-iety*, I wrote about my '64 Rampside. The other, much bigger, project has been diagnosing and fixing a loss of power in my '66 500 coupe, aka "the white car". For quite some time, its performance has been a bit unpredictable – seemingly fine one day and not-so-fine the next. As background, the engine extends ideas and concepts found in experimental engines Chevrolet built as it was researching what a 3rd-generation Corvair could be. A few of its major features are:

- Significantly-larger displacement (190 CID vs. 164 CID), achieved by using aftermarket VW cylinders and pistons
- More-aggressive performance but still civilized manners for the street, achieved by using a hydraulic roller camshaft
- Substantially-more carburetion, achieved by using twin Weber IDA-3C "triple throat" carburetors (with custom individual-runner intake manifolds)
- Freer-breathing exhaust but retaining the comfort of a heater, achieved by using custom large-diameter steel exhaust manifolds (rather than headers)
- And a few things to support the engine, such as a transmission that has a taller first gear (2.95:1 vs. 3.11:1) and a 5th-gear over-drive, front and rear anti-sway bars, wider wheels and tires, SafeGuard engine management system, etc.

While helping Kevin Nash collect some data for his fan project, which involved time on a drive-on dyno, we discovered that the engine was down about 25% on power. (!!!!) After much discussion with various Corvair experts, we pulled the passenger side valve cover and used a dial indicator and fixture to measure what the valve train was doing (using the #1 intake valve @ .050" lift), and discovered that the engine was retarded about 21 degrees! Greg King took the lead, with my son Kyle assisting, in pulling the powertrain and disassembling the engine. We discovered that, yes indeed, the relationship of the cam gear to the crank gear was awry. It turns out that an experimental cam gear we had installed many years ago, when the engine was first put together, had moved all the way to one end of its adjustable travel. That distance was about three cam gear teeth, and each tooth is about 7 degrees. 3 x 7 = 21 degrees, more or less, so the observed change matched the dial indicator measurements. Greg and Kyle re-indexed the cam, used the dial indicator again to check for proper valve train behavior, then reassembled the engine and reinstalled the power train. We immediately felt a marked improvement in performance according to the "butt dyno". On August 1, Kevin Nash, Kyle, and I returned to the dyno shop (Carburetor Connection in Kirkland—very knowledgeable staff) and continued with the original project, which was collecting performance data on the stock Corvair fan. It also afforded us the chance to tune the engine a bit.

#### Some interesting observations:

How tight the fan belt was made a substantial difference in fan RPM, and therefore, how much HP the fan consumed. It will be very interesting to see the data from the Nash Fan once it's installed (soon) since its design should consume significantly-less power. This engine wants initial timing advance at the high end of the range recommended for a stock 140 HP engine (16 – 20 degrees). It made more power with 20 degrees initial timing advance than 18. The engine burns 91 octane ethanol-free fuel and spark is provided by a SafeGuard. The distributor only provides a low-voltage trigger signal. This engine is truly a "torque monster". It is producing maximum torque by 2250 RPM (the lowest point that the dyno collected data) and stays there until about 4100 RPM, gradually tapering off to 5000 RPM, where measurement stopped. Regarding the last point, creating a wide band of usable torque was the #1 design objective with this engine. Ray Sedman, in particular, influenced my thinking on this topic. I don't think Ray has written an article about this but I found one that makes most of the same points he does: https://bit.ly/2XkCzps.

#### Some salient points:

The "area under the curve" in the lower RPM range matters a lot for a street car – less so for a race car.

Don't pay much attention to peak torque and HP numbers because they don't matter nearly as much, on the street, as does the shape of the torque curve.

Focus on percentage changes during tuning rather than absolute numbers, partly because different dynos will produce different numbers for the same car.

In any case, it's great to have the car back on the road. After installing the Nash Fan and collecting data with it, we will be converting to Electronic Fuel Injection using throttle-body replacements for the Weber IDA-3C carburetors and the Simple Digital Systems computer. (Ray Sedman sells the SDS system and related items for Corvair installations.)


