April Meeting Program More on Chevrolet Engines with Lee Folsom

This month we continue with our program featuring Chevrolet Engines. Significant changes were made in Chevrolet engines in 1929 (6 cylinders), 1937 (four main bearings), 1953 (full pressure lubrication and aluminum pistons), and in 1962 (7 main bearings, hollow push-rods and no rocker arm shaft). We have not mentioned something that happened in 1955, but we will have to save that for another day. What part did these changes play in the overall development of Chevrolet engines?

In 1953 a puzzling set of three quite different engines was used. What were the objectives of Chevrolet engineers in these offerings? One of these engines, of course, was the full pressure engine which has played a very important role in engine replacement.

Come to the April meeting prepared to share your experiences, observations, and questions regarding these engines. We will have lots of pictures to illustrate our discussion.


Annual Old Car Breakfast Tour May 6 A great Spring Tour to start the season

The Chev coupe carcass arrived sporting a 1942 GMC military six, a rare engine but the wrong one! The first problem was getting it to Seattle. The winter was setting in through out the Rockies. Major carriers would not cart it without numerous requirements. The gypsy truckers would not cart it after mid-November. At last it arrived around Thanksgiving Day 2003. My wife did not consider it a thanks giving present. When it arrived at the restorers shop we met it with friends. I still recall the words of Barbara, the friend and co-worker of my wife, "Oh my gosh what a piece of *#+&!!!"

I have personally restored 5 cars; 1953 Hudson Hornet Twin H. 1967 Austin Healey 3000 Mk 3



This is the first one that I had done professionally. It was, however, a sentimental favorite.

The frame-off rotisserie restoration.

The body was well rusted. I had a sheet metal specialist hand fabricate several body parts. He welded them in to where a magnifying glass cannot detect the seams.



The only non stock part is the motor. I used a 1959 Chev 6 cylinder. I like high tech options like oil pumps, insert bearings! I had the water pump modified to measure the same size as the original and a kit that made the valve and side covers look like 1948.

It was painted the original Oxford Maroon and upholstered in light and dark gray interior. The most unusual problem was the electrical grounding. The 1946-1948 Chevy's had two grounds. This information is thanks to VCCA National technical advisor for 42-48 Chevrolets, Austin Ott.

The hardest part of the restoration was the radio. Few people still work on the old tube radios. I took it to three modern upscale "Car Toys" radio joints. All three did not even know that 6 volt radios and antennae even existed. I fund out that NO repro manufactures of the old 6 volt antennae even still exist. Finally, I discovered a manufacturer who went out of business, but had three left over. I bought one. A Chev radio expert in Portland bought the rest.

Test drive that vintage Chevy to see how good a gas mileage it gets while viewing beautiful scenery and lake-front homes and parks. — Meet at the Lake Forest Park Shopping Center, located on Bothell Way NE and Ballinger Way NE at the north end & west side of Lake Washington. — Arrive at 9:00AM so you will have time to top off your gas tank and leave on the tour by 9:30AM. — Gather at the southeast corner of the shopping center on Bothell Way NE where there is a gas station. NW Meet Update – "Chevy Rally in the Valley"

We're looking forward to seeing all our current VCCA friends and making some new ones at the meet in Yakima during June 20-24 this summer. Although the Clarion Hotel is now full there are still accommodations across the street at Days Inn (800-248-3360 dials directly to this hotel). Their rate is \$69.95 for two people and includes an expanded continental breakfast. Rooms include refrigerators and microwave ovens; there is an outdoor pool. Call right away if you need room reservations.

Please be assured that everyone registering for this meet will be assigned a parking space according to registration number in our secured lot at the Clarion. So, even if you're staying elsewhere, you have a reserved parking space at the Meet Headquarters.

If you can't make it for the entire Meet, we encourage you pick a day or two that fits your schedule and interest. Our last day, Saturday, includes an all day tour to unique Ft. Simcoe and to the Toppenish murals; with the Awards Banquet in the evening. Judging, car displays & pictures are Friday morning at the Agriculture Museum, which includes a huge park where there will be demonstrations and rides. An Orchard Tour takes us back to the hotel area. The Women's Lunch is Thursday, followed by local minitours (no cost but you must pre-register for these). Thursday evening look for special treats in the parking lot. Wednesday is the Wood Tour, but newer cars are welcome; there will be two routes for this tour. Again, no cost, but you do need to register before April 15. Meet registration fee of \$35 covers the tours, registration packet, picture, meet license plate & dash plaque. It does not cover the meals or shirts which must be preordered on the registration form.



As a matter of fact I thought one piece was ready for plating but they didn't so they made it better. It is good to work with a business that takes pride in there work.
