

Windshield Wipers

It's spring, and the brutal winter weather conditions are hopefully behind us now. Our windshield wipers have probably received some damage from winter's ice and snow. If the wipers are not working properly, under certain lighting conditions, visibility through the windshield can be severely compromised from road grime and dirty water not being properly wiped away.

We are still in Washington's rainy season. Replacement wiper blades are an inexpensive investment in our safety. Blade replacement is an easily forgotten maintenance item when it's not raining. So, here is a safety reminder to check those wipers, making sure they are in good condition and ready for when they are needed.

Answer to March Pop Quiz

The question was, why did windshield wipers on old Chevrolets often slow down when the car was going up a hill? Possible answers were:

A. More rain hits the windshield when it is tilted upward.

B. The downward force of the wipers on the windshield causes more drag on the blades.

C. The wiper motor was out of breath.

The Answer: C, the wiper motor was probably a vacuum motor, using manifold vacuum, which dropped when the engine was under load, such as when going up hill. Thus it might be said that the vacuum motor was "out of breath".

From the Glove Box

Trailer Maintenance

Several issues are common with car trailers; i.e.- brakes jamming, hubs seizing up, wheels coming off, and brakes failing. These issues have even occurred on new trailers, but most problems could have been avoided by proper maintenance.

Various PSVCCA members have offered the following general advice:

Throw tires away if over 10 years old, have cracks, show rot, have bulges, have excessive wear, or have obvious damage.

Torque wheel nuts to specification.

CAUTION: Re-torquing a nut (or a bolt for that matter) does not necessarily mean tightening it. When checking a nut that has been previously torqued, if the nut does not turn when the specified torque is applied, the nut should be backed off and then re-torqued. (The temptation is to just start tightening it until it moves just a little bit more. If it is not loose to start with, this will almost certainly eventually lead to over-torquing and possible failure.)

The most common recommendation is to use no lubricant on wheel lug nuts except if you have stainless steel involved, as lubrication can result in over-tightening, and furthermore, the nuts may still work loose. Most torque specifications assume dry threads unless otherwise specified.

If lug nuts are lubricated, the recommended torque will be much lower than for a dry lug. Do not use dry torque specifications with lubricated threads.

NOTE: Recommended torque values depend upon the material and grade of the bolt, the bolt diameter, the surface coating on the bolt, threads per inch, and any lubrication on the threads. An excellent description titled "What is the Proper Torque to Use on a Given Bolt" is provided at http://www.zerofast.com/torque.htm.

Put the hitch and ball in the receiver on the car at 90 degrees to enhance your ability to tighten the ball on the hitch, and then stand on the wrench to tighten the ball.

I have discussed this topic with three outfits, which I will refer to here as Sources 1, 2, and 3. (Source 1 services RVs. Source 2 builds and services utility trailers. Source 3 is a popular tire dealer. Boat trailers are not addressed here, as they commonly require more frequent service.)

These recommendations should be taken as helpful suggestions. It is recommended that specific maintenance procedures for your equipment be followed if available. Use the following recommendations at your own risk. If in doubt, seek specific advice from a qualified mechanic familiar with your equipment.

^{*} Source 1 said there is no rule for how tight to make a wheel bearing because there are many different axles and different bearings. It depends upon the axle, sealed bearings or not, etc. Some wheels are torqued to 150 to 200 ft-lbs (not common). Source 1 said you would have to take a class to do this properly.

^{**} Source 3 said most trailer manufacturers recommend tightening lug nuts each time you use trailer. Use a TGI (Tire Guides Inc.) Chart. This chart lists car manufacturers and provides recommended torque for each. The chart is available from Tire Guides, Inc. at http://tireguides.com/default.asp.

^{***} ATAYCMI = As Tight As You Can Make It.

^{****} According to Source 2, trailers rated for more than 3000 lbs are required to have brakes, either hydraulic or electric. If brakes are required, they must have an Emergency Break Away Brake (see RCW for details).
