Secretary: Minutes accepted as printed in the Tappet Clatter.







Don and Sallie Comstock set up a beautiful camping display with lawn chairs, table, picnic basket and a wine bottle




Remembering Gail Darby

The March 26 memorial service for Gail Darby was a touching event for all who were able to attend. Gail died unexpectedly on December 26, 2010, at Group Health Emergency Center in Bellevue, Washington. Gail was 57 years old.

Gail was born in Coon Rapids. Gail and Jim were married in 1974 in Dedham, IA. They moved to Bellevue, WA, in 1985, where Gail was Director of Nursing at Restorative Care Center. She and Jim joined Puget Sound Region in 1987. Gail was Tappet Clatter editor in the 1990s, for which she received a 1st Place award in 1998.

Over the years they participated in and hosted may events. In recent years we especially think of the Strawberry Shortcake Socials held in June, for which Gail prepared the shortcake according to her special recipe. Jim explained that the recipe was her special recipe because she "tweaked" the recipe in ways that she never documented. Jim and the boys, James Jr. and Jeffery Gaylord, gave tribute to Gail at the memorial by preparing shortcake according to what they could determine was the correct recipe, but without the "tweaks".

In addition to cooking, Gail loved gardening, playing cards and knitting. She was a member of the Marysville Machine Knitting Guild of Northern Washington. She kept a supply of knitted garments on hand to give to people on special occasions. Many of those garments were displayed at the memorial.

More On Degreasers

We had a lively discussion on degreasers at our March meeting. Treated parts were displayed and costs discussed. The cost of a gallon of Simple Green or Kerosene is about \$10. A gallon of Oil Eater sells for about \$17 at local parts stores, and about \$12 at COSTCO. Several members vouched for the effectiveness of Oil Eater. One person suggested that Oil Eater works better and faster with hot water. Another person said that they lacked confidence in Simple Green.

Several new products were discussed, including: diesel fuel, Meguiar's Degreaser, paint thinner, carburetor cleaner, brake cleaner, and Sandman Soup (not to be confused with the powerful poison used in the Dungeon and Dragons game).

Diesel fuel is sometimes used for degreasing in degreasing tanks, but no comments were made as to its ease of use or effectiveness.

Don Comstock uses Meguiar's Degreaser. Meguiar's makes a very aggressive degreaser that can be repeatedly sprayed on larger items such as car frames. Two (2) minutes and not more than 5 minutes between spraying was recommended, followed by pressure washing to removed grease and residual Meguiar's.

Jim Farris uses paint thinner as a replacement for solvent. The oil based mineral spirits works better than the newer water based type. It's an effective cleaner for taking off non-hardened grease and oils if soaked long enough.

Bill Barker keeps carburetor cleaner handy over his bench for stubborn cleaning jobs. Brake cleaner can also be effective for degreasing, especially on brake related parts.

Bill Damm uses SuperClean to clean up oil and grease, and it will remove paint (learned by accident). It's not really intended to be a paint remover, but if the paint isn't fully cured or isn't compatible with this stuff it will take the paint off too. Bill thinks it is the same thing as white-wall cleaner. Be sure to wear chemical resistant gloves or it will cause your hands to crack. To get things really clean, use some Fantastic or similar cleaner, right after using the SuperClean. Seems the SuperClean cuts the oil and grease but trying to clean it with a paper towel just smears it around. Super Clean breaks grease down so that Fantastic can clean what is left.

Bill Barker said Sandman Soup is a common degreaser used in the Northwest for degreasing larger parts. Sound familiar? (The term Sandman Soup is used in the game Dungeons and Dragons where it is defined as a "contact poison that causes immediate unconsciousness". Guess the name tells how powerful this stuff is.) This stuff also calls for extreme caution if used.

The Sandman Soup recipe to remove paint and grease is: 1 can of Drano (lye crystals) in 4 gallons water. A large garbage can works well for this. For quicker action, heat it up, but be certain to avoid the fumes and body contact. Let it set overnight, or if it's a large part, it can be left for a week.

To just remove rust, use phosphoric acid, which is available at most paint stores.

CAUTIONS

Many degreaser products warn that they should only be used in well-ventilated areas and to take care to protect yourself from stray mist if the product is sprayed. Eye and skin protection should also be considered.

Kerosene is listed on the MSDS sheet as a possible carcinogen, so caution should be taken to avoid exposure.

Some products have been found to be more effective when heated or when mixed with hot water. It is particularly im-

portant with these to protect yourself against inhalation.

Bob Reller warned that some degreaser products attack and dissolve aluminum parts, so read cautions on the labels carefully. Other people said that they have had the same experience with aluminum parts.

Someone also indicated that some products can also adversely affect pot metal.


