A Thought On the April Club Auction Meeting

The April Puget Sound Region Meeting program will be the annual auction. I have some thoughts to share regarding this program. The auction started as a result of members going to the Portland Swap meet club booth and finding other members had brought parts they would like to buy. The rationale for the auction; why haul all those parts to Portland to exchange, why not bring them to a meeting, auction them off and give the money to the club treasury?

Many of us have items that we would like have go to deserving fellow members in order to help the club fund raising efforts.

Over the past few years a question has evolved; is this activity a treasure hunt or a junk sharing time? I have donated parts I could sell at a swap meet in the \$30 to \$40 range that are sold at club auction for under \$5. It seems I would be better off to sell the item at a swap meet and donate the money. Why didn't that item go for a higher price? Perhaps only one member wanted it. Some members have misunderstood the process and brought parts needing much work. A couple of generous members will bid just to keep the bidding moving up a dollar or two. While a car part may be worth big \$\$\$ if there is no one in the room who can use that part, someone may get it for a \$1. This is a big discouragement to the person who brought the item. Or if there are no bids, the person who brought the item has been asked to bid a \$1 just to take the item home. This penalizes persons for bringing nice items.

What seems to stimulate good prices are parts/items that have universal appeal to many years of application, spark plugs are one example. Tools would be another high interest item with good auction potential. Items that are historic/antique related also do well at club auctions. Every item need not be auto related.

I would like to suggest the option of the owner being allowed to place a starting bid on items of great value. For example if I were to bring a new old stock oil pressure gauge for an early four cylinder car, I would place a starting bid on it of \$50. If no one bids above that price, I take the item home with no penalty. If this were the policy I might be willing to donate some nice items. If I bring a role of emery cloth, I would not put a starting bid on it and it may only sell for \$1 or if no one bids on it I take it home. That's fine with me.

The Board has submitted the following addition to the By-Laws:


Add to Article V:

Hydraulic Jack Seals—The Good, The Bad, and The Ugly—By Bob Stamnes

Ken Hovda wrote:

"The seal is going bad in my hydraulic jack. It settles slowly if I have much weight on it. I was wondering about where I could get the seals and how big a job it is to rebuild it."

I suspect this is a very common problem. I have a leaking jack myself. I did a little research and found a detailed description on the web for rebuilding a floor jack.

The following is the intro from this page and gives you an idea of how complex fixing a floor jack can be. I was surprised at the complexity, but found 19 steps on how to do it that included sources for parts and things to try.

ENJOY!!!

"This is a 1 1/4 ton hydraulic floor jack my father passed on to me. He bought it new during the 1970s. It began to leak down a little a few months ago. The lift arm no longer rises when the handle is pumped up and down. (I was able to pull the lift arm up by hand and it settled slowly enough that I could make a photo with the arm partially raised.)

I checked to be sure it was adequately filled with fluid, but that was not the problem. A few months before this problem, there were bubbles coming up through the vents at the filler plug. At that time I raised the lift arm with the handle, released the jack's valve, and let the arm fall slowly several times to purge air from the system. Finally, one day, the lift arm would not rise at



all. If filling with fluid and purging air from the system do not restore function, there is probably internal leakage, even though fluid is not leaking from the jack. From what I have read, forty years of service is a reasonable time for a hydraulic jack to operate before it needs a rebuild.

A word of caution: Rebuilding this jack presented several challenges that seemed almost insurmountable at the occurrence of each. Rebuilding this jack was much more difficult than simply replacing a few "O" rings, and it required more than the very few hours some say are required for rebuilding a jack. Further, I had to make several special tools to get the job done. If you want to attempt rebuilding a jack and you are not a member of the web site Instructables, I would encourage you to pick a password and a screen name, and join. Doing that will allow you to download a PDF of this Instructable for printing, or to view at any time later on your computer, assuming you wish to consult what I have done as a guide.

When putting fluid into a jack never use anything other than hydraulic jack fluid. Do not use motor oil or brake fluid. Brake fluid makes the seals swell.

At this link you will find one man's description of how he rejuvenated his twenty-five year old jack by flushing its insides with a solvent, letting it dry completely, and filling it with fresh hydraulic jack fluid. It could be worth a try. I did find one manual for a floor jack that said the fluid should be changed every year. The procedure is to place the jack over a large pan, remove the filler plug, turn the jack on its side and let it drain. Then fill it again"

Some suggestions:

Please discourage the practice of "bundling" items. I know it moves more stuff but it makes me take items I don't want. If there is no bid on the rusty 1948 hubcap, the owner takes it home. Don't pile that hubcap on the next item in line that I want to bid on. Now I am reluctant to bid higher not wanting to haul more junk home.

Keep it clean or boxed well. I have a 1937 truck master cylinder (fits 1936 to 1946 trucks). I have no use for it, but it is encased in years of grease and dirt gathered over years of accumulation. I won't bring it if I don't get it cleaned up.

Look through those boxes in the back corner that may have items you no longer need. Also consider a donation of time for a specific service...for example, donate a valve adjustment.

News from the National Board of Directors

David Gowan, Area # 3 Director

The 2014 National VCCA Board of Directors met on March 28-30 in St. Louis, MO. After touring Modern Litho in Jefferson City, where the G&D magazine is printed, we commenced business. Through Skype we met our new Editor, Kate Sullivan, formerly an Editor at Hemmings Classic Car, and our new Creative Directors, Steve and Lucy Blakey, who have also worked in car related publications. The BOD feels that hiring these professionals was a major achievement in 2013.

Membership dues have been fixed for 8 years despite increasing costs of postage and printing. **Renewal now will \$40 per member number** will be considered a 'family' membership allowing two adult votes on National VCCA business.

The major news is that the **VCCA will now recognize 'personalized' Chevrolets** (street legal, registered & insured with Chevrolet or GM produced drive trains) in a separate Chapter and judging structure. At this point it will be up to the Meet Chair whether or not to allow 'personalized' Chevrolets to participate in the events.

Another monumental issue was to **welcome GMC trucks as full members of the VCCA** to be shown and judged alongside Chevrolet trucks. Revised judging rules that will accommodate the GMCs will be forthcoming in 2015. Both of these decisions were based on majority input from VCCA members. Though mixed reactions to these changes are anticipated it is important to note that your BOD finally took forward looking action after considering them for many years. A prevailing sentiment is that the VCCA is now more responsive to a changing market without losing our basic tenant of "Preserving and Restoring Chevrolets".
