March PS-VCCA Meeting Program
Replacing Rusted-Out Sheet Metal

The first step is to expose damaged area by stripping the paint and filler down to bare metal with chemical stripper, sanding or sandblasting or a combination of these. Chemical stripping requires a minimum of a brush, scraper and sandpaper. A grinder or disk sander is cleaner if you have the tool. Sandblasting does the best job exposing holes and pits. The key is to use what you have or can borrow.

Next, assess the damage. If it is a few tiny holes or pits in a non-structural area such as a floor pan or lower corner of a door or fender, and you have limited tools and skill

you might prefer denting in the rusted area about two inches around the damage about a quarter inch deep, sanding with 36 grit paper and applying layers of fiberglass mat and resin from a can. U-Pol makes an excellent product as is the stuff I brought to the meeting. Treat the area with a self-etching primer such as DP by Ditzler then use body filler, sand and finish with primer, sealer and paint.

If you plan on cutting out the damage and welding in fresh metal you must have access to a welder (person and wire feed welder) for best results. You also need an air compressor capable of running air tools, a high speed cutoff tool (Harbor Freight on sale \$7 to \$10),






an orbital sander (about \$35) and possibly a crimping tool, air or manual. You will also need clamps and/or magnets to hold the patch panel in place while welding. Hammers and dollies will aid in shaping the patch panel to fit the hole.

The process is to cut out the damaged metal, make a patch that fits the hole as close as possible for butt welding or inside the crimped area for lap welding. Bend the fresh metal to take the shape of the damaged piece and clamp it in place flush or below the surface of the surrounding metal. Tack weld the patch in place every inch or so then go back around tacking

between your welds until the panel is welded into place.

Don't let the metal get too hot to avoid warping. If you don't weld the panel solid (butt welds) and for lap welds make certain the seam is a bit low on the outside, grind down the welds and apply a thin layer of waterproof body filler such as AllMetal to fill low areas and voids. Welding lap panels can be done by welding along the edge of the patch or small holes can be drilled or punched around the edges

of the patch and welded in place much like a spot weld. Lap welds do not need to be welded in solid. If possible apply AllMetal to both sides of the panel and patch. Before finishing apply a generous



coat or two of self etching primer (DP) to all bare metal. AllMetal can go over DP but fiberglass products must be applied to bare metal. If both sides of the patched area are accessible the inside can be finished as the outside or can be sealed with DP and painted and/or undercoated. The topside can

then be skim coated with an easy-to-sand lightweight body filler and sanded, leveling out the body panel for final finish.

The final step is to treat the area like any other area that is to be repainted. Prime with a sanding primer, sand smooth for repaint, seal and repaint the area.

### **Brakes Revisited**

The wheel cylinders and master cylinder on the 1953 Chevrolet I recently purchased were pitted and leaking. Actually, they were encrusted with rust and frozen. Should I replace them with new cylinders or have the old cylinders sleeved? New wheel cylinders are very inexpensive for a 1953 Chevrolet, so why bother to go through all the effort of sleeving the old cylinders? (In a lot of cases with older vehicles, sleeving cylinders is less expensive than buying new replacements, and they will last indefinitely.)

Future corrosion is the reason!!!

If a car is not driven a lot and if the brake fluid is not changed regularly, chances are high that the brake fluid will collect water over the years. This moisture then encourages corrosion and pitting of the wheel cylinders. Pitting leads to cylinder leakage and dangerous braking.

This is not as much of an issue if the car is driven regularly and/or the brake fluid is changed on a regular basis.

Sleeving wheel cylinders and/or a master cylinder replaces the metal that comes in contact with the seals and brake fluid with a more corrosion-resistant metal. It is common to sleeve cylinders with a material like stainless steel. If your car sits a lot without frequent brake fluid changes, your best bet might be to use sleeved cylinders.

In my case, Dave and I went with sleeving the existing master cylinder, rather than purchasing a new master cylinder. We also decided that, in my case, where I plan to drive the car often, sleeving the wheel cylinders was not necessary, and that it would be less expensive to purchase new wheel cylinders rather than sleeving the old cylinders. I also intend to change the brake fluid at regular intervals. If my use of the car changes, I saved the original wheel cylinders which I will have sleeved.

If the wheel cylinders in the car are original Chevrolet parts, then you may also want to have them sleeved so you maintain the original equipment.
