
Ford sedan (I'm guessing at the year.)

Chevrolee Comments...

on repairing, rebuilding, or replacing your Chevrolet engine

From 1929 through 1932 Chevrolet engines had a bore of 3 5/16" and a stroke of 3 3/4" giving a displacement of 194 cubic inches. In 1933 the stroke of the Master and truck engine was increased to 4"; the bore remained the same. This resulted in a displacement of 206 cubic inches which continued through 1936. The 1933 engine also had larger valves than previous models.



The cam shaft now used one replaceable bearing in the center, while the other two ran directly in the cast iron block. The ignition system was redesigned using a larger distributor cap, 14mm spark plugs, and new ignition points. This was also the first year for a vacuum advance control on the distributor and a thermostatic heat control valve on the manifold.

The changes in 1934 were limited mainly to the cylinder head. The exhaust valves were now at an angle making larger valves possible. The compression ratio was increased producing an increase in horsepower from 60-80.

Several important improvements were made in 1935. The earlier engines had a small rectangular valve keeper, which fit through a slot in the valve stem. These keepers would sometimes pull through the valve spring caps causing considerable damage. In 1935 two "U" shaped keepers were used in a groove around each valve stem eliminating this problem.

Through 1934 the connecting rods actually dipped oil from troughs in the oil pan. Starting in 1935 a system of pipes and nozzles aimed a stream of oil at each connecting rod dipper greatly increasing the oil supply to the rods, particularly at higher speeds. The aiming of these nozzles is extremely important when engines are overhauled or rebuilt.

The 1935 engine now had two replaceable cam bearings, center and rear, while the front still ran directly in the block. The water pump was redesigned using a larger impeller. Front and rear engine mounts were changed, this basic design was used through 1951.


We are planning for Saturday, April 23 with a rainy day backup of April 30.

Dave Gowan, Area 3 Director, also attended our meeting.

<u>Secretary</u>: February meeting minutes accepted as printed in Tappet Clatter.

<u>Treasurer</u>: Sallie Comstock gave an overview of the previous month. She finally received bills for the Roster and recent months Tappet Clatters and paid them all amounting to nearly \$1,000. Our balance is about where it should be at this time of year.

Membership: Donna Onat has mailed all Rosters that haven't been claimed in person. We now have 76 members.




