Puget Sound Region VCCA General Meeting Minutes


November 23, 2009

Welcome: No new members or guests were present at this meeting.


Secretary: Minutes were accepted as amended.

Chevrolet filmstrips used to train salesmen. The featured evening home visits to prospective



Impala Lights Out

It was a 1966 Chevrolet Impala with a 327 cubic inch V8 and an automatic transmission. Dad bought the car new and drove it to California to visit my wife and I in Sacramento. He thought that everyone should have a new car now and then. He had traded in a 1959 Chevrolet Impala.

When dad passed away in 1977, the car stayed parked in the driveway for several years. I kept it up, driving it occasionally, doing small repairs and maintenance as needed. I replaced the carburetor, repaired the rust around the rear window, had the tires replaced, and replaced the front ball joints. I kept the car washed and vacuumed, and generally kept it running. Mom did not drive, but kept the car to make it look like someone was home.

The front ball joint replacement had been especially difficult. After cutting and chiseling away the rivets holding the ball joints, and using the infamous "pickle fork" wedge to dislodge the joint attachment to the control arms, I was able to install the new ball joints. Only to find out when I had the front end aligned that the new ball joints were out of tolerance.

I took the report to Schuck's where the new ball joints had been purchased, and they agreed to pay for the installation and alignment of a second set of ball joints. After the new ball joints had been installed and aligned, the car drove pretty good. Except it pulled ever so slightly to the right when I braked. Not perfect, but tolerable.

The whole point of all of this background is that I felt as though I knew the car. I had been around it one way or another for nearly all of its 23 years. I had complete confidence in the car and my ability to deal with it.

So it was in 1990 when the time came to make a trip east to Minneapolis, Minnesota. My son was graduating from a two-year Bible College, and I wanted to take my wife and mother back to see him graduate. My mother especially had always liked the smooth ride of the 1966 Impala, and the car had always been dependable. At this point it only had about 66,000 actual miles on it. Just like new. So the Impala was the car of choice.

Even so, it was still a 23-year-old car. I packed some emergency supplies such as duct tape, a new fan belt, silicone rubber sealant, paper, water, oil, windshield washer fluid, a pan, string, wire, and some tools.



The car drove beautifully on the trip to Minneapolis. But as a precaution, I always did a walk-around whenever we parked the car, just to look things over. So it was that we had just driven into the parking lot at the school in Minneapolis (actually Medicine Lake, just north of Minneapolis) that I looked under the front of the car to see coolant dripping from the radiator.

We were about a half hour early for the graduation, so I told my wife and mother to walk in and I would see what I could do about the leak.

How do I raise the oil pressure in my 216 engine from its current 5 psi back to the original pressure of 15 psi. What could be causing the low pressure? Can you give me some direction on correcting this problem?

Region Logo Display Bracket By Bill Damm

It's easy to fabricate a region logo display bracket out of some sheet metal, or stiff tin.

If a 4" logo decal (from the Club Store) is to be used, measure in about 2 1/8" from the edge of the material and center punch it. With a compass, draw a 4" diameter circle using the center punch as a pivot point.

Cut around the circle just slightly outside the line leaving a 1" tab, or so, for attaching the bracket to a license plate bolt, or whatever.

Drill a hole at the center punch point the same size as a small nail. Then barely tap the nail through the hole into an 8" or so stick of wood 2" from one end of the stick. Holding onto the other end of the stick, hold the bracket near a disk sander, or grinding wheel, while pivoting the bracket on its nail to grind the cut edge down to the 4" diameter line. Presto, a perfect circle!

File off any sharp edges, and drill a mounting hole in the mounting tab.

Clean the part, and paint it if you like, then carefully apply the decal to the new bracket.

The Club Store has lots of decals in case there are any mistakes.

Correcting Your Speedometer

The speedo in all of my cars of the last few years has been screwed up. By screwed up I mean it doesn't accurately reflect the real speed of the car because the transmissions have been changed from stock.

I've used the GPS speed function on my iPhone to give me a better idea of how fast I'm going, but it still doesn't solve the problem.

For Turbo 350/400 and 700R4 transmissions there is a little plastic gear (like the one in the picture to the right) that you change in the tailsection of the transmission. The same holds true for manual transmissions like a T-5 or a Tremec.

To correct your speedometer, use the following formula:

[Number of Drive gear teeth (inside tailshaft)] x [axle ratio (rear end ratio)] x [20.168] divided by [the outside diameter of the tire in inches] = [number of teeth needed].

In my case (700R4) the numbers are:

[18] x [3.55] x [20.168] divided by [27.69 (215/75/15 tire)] = [46.54 (they only make a 45 tooth gear)]

If you don't want to do the math, Bowtie Overdrives has the same thing in an online calculator that is at: http://700r4.com/speedoCalc/speedocalc.shtml.

You can buy any of the speedo gears from Danchuck, Bowtie, Ecklers or maybe even at Napa for about \$10.00. Happy cruising at the right speed.

Golden Steer Steak and Rib House

For several years now, we have been having our annual Puget Sound Region -VCCA banquet at the Golden Steer Steak and Rib House in Kent, WA. But how many of us are aware of the people who own and operate the restaurant?

Jim and Suzanne Berrios bought the restaurant in about 1999. Earlier this year they celebrated their first ten years in business. Jim had previously worked for the Denny's Corporation as vice-president of operations. At the time he was spending more time on the road, and away from his family, than he wanted. Then the opportunity to buy the Golden Steer presented itself. Jim and Suzanne made the change and took on a major commitment.

The previous owners had been there for 34 years. With "regulars" still coming in, they decided not to change the menu (except to add vegetarian dishes), or the décor ,or most of the staff. As of last April, the cook and the dishwasher who were there ten years ago (when they bought the restaurant) are still working behind the scenes. (The cook is 72 years old.)

But Jim and Suzanne wanted to build more of a sense of community through personal involvement in the business and in the community. One of the things Jim said that he had been missing in the corporate environment was the chance to exhibit a personal touch in what he was doing.

They have both made a point to be active in the community where they both work and live. They value their connection to customers and their staff. They host meetings for nearly all Kent's service clubs, contribute prizes for school events, provide food for the needy, and adopt needy families at Christmas.



The first year they owned the restaurant, they began a tradition of closing early on Thanksgiving Day, sending paid staff home, and reopening with a core of volunteers to feed some of Kent's neediest families, as recommended by the Kent Food Bank or the school district.

For their volunteer work, they have received many local and state awards and recognitions.

It is that personal touch, the fine food, and warm surroundings that bring us back each year. We again look forward to this year's annual banquet in January.

Note: Most of us use the rear entrance when coming to the banquet because it is right next to the banquet room.
