








<u>Program:</u> Jim Seiber showed the DVD from last year's Carson Valley, Nevada 6-Cylinder Tour.

"In recognition of your service as DIRECTOR, Puget Sound Region VCCA".



H.B. 1134 Update

Under the bill, the initial \$35 license plate fee for collector vehicle and horseless carriage license plates would have remained and a new annual \$30 renewal fee would have been added. The bill was in response to concerns that people were using vehicles registered as collector cars on a daily basis and avoiding fees.

The SEMA Action Network (SAN), a nationwide partnership of car clubs, and individuals, had lobbied against the bill.

SAN reports that according to House Transportation Committee Chairperson Judy Clibborn the bill will not receive committee consideration this year.

Will Super Coolants Solve Your Overheating Problems?

The consensus from my research is that super coolants can lower engine operating temperatures, but they are not a substitute for fixing a problem. Malfunctioning water pump, thermostat, radiator fan clutch, and incorrect engine timing, incorrect fuel mixture, or a clogged radiator can cause overheating. Super coolants can change the operating temperature of an engine by from 3 to 30 degrees, depending if it is added to water, or an antifreeze mixture. It makes sense to investigate potential causes before trying super coolants.

Super coolants enhance the transfer of heat across liquid/metal barriers, by reducing surface tension, which promotes thermal conductivity or heat transfer. Super coolants are sometimes referred to as wetting agents as they enhance the microscopic contact between liquid and metal. Heat transfer is important to move heat from the engine to the radiator and into the air. Heat transfer between liquid and metal is vital in the process.

There are many engine coolants used in cars and motorcycles. There are waterless coolants and coolants that can be added to water or to systems with a mix of antifreeze and water. Most super coolants contain corrosion inhibitors, but this must be confirmed before purchasing any product as some super coolants require other additives for better corrosion control. Look for a reference to ASTM D-2570, which is a standard test for determining corrosivity. Some super coolants are biodegradable where others are not. Not all super coolants perform the same according to test results reported.

Some may result in a cooler extended idling temperature or a cooler engine head temperature (DEI with only water), where others may result in lower cruising or climbing temperatures (Justice Brothers with only water). Of four products tested in one case, two performed best in radiators without antifreeze and two best for situations requiring antifreeze. Of the four tested, all worked but each worked in a different way and to a different degree.

One test of Hy-Per Lube Super Coolant found that operating temperatures went from the highest operating temperature to the lowest operating temperature for each of the following, 50/50 glycol antifreeze and water, 50/50 mix with super coolant, water only, water plus super coolant, respectively. You could conclude from this that water plus Hy-Per Lube Super Coolant results in the lowest engine temperature, like 20-30 degrees cooler than the operating temperature of water by itself. Glycol based antifreeze and water actually raises the operating temperature, but does protect against freezing.

Super Coolants You Can Add to Water

The first four products below are best known for use in passenger cars and have been comparison tested. The results were presented in Turbo Magazine. All four proved beneficial to varying degrees depending upon application. See (http://www.turbomagazine.com/features/0703_turp_cooling_system_additives/test_results.html).

The following products are all wetting agents. They can be added to water or to a water/antifreeze mix to reduce operating temperatures of a liquid cooled engine from 3 to 30 degrees depending upon circumstances.

Hy-Per Lube Super Coolant

Redline Water Wetter Super Coolant

Engine Ice, by Cycle Logic Products, Inc., http://engineice.com/ It appears to reduce engine water temperatures and change the boiling point of coolant. Discusses the use in racing vehicles where thermostats are open all the

time versus passenger vehicles. Cycle Logic also warns that Engine Ice's effectiveness may be greatly reduced in modern cars where electronics control operating temperature of the engine (expect no more than 2 degree advantage).

Purple Ice Super Coolant, by Royal Purple, (http://www.royalpurple.com or http://www.coolerradiators.com). Royal Purple recommends a minimum of 20 percent antifreeze concentration be used in street driven vehicles because Purple Ice has no effect on the boiling and / or freezing point of water. Product should be added once every year if with water or every two years if with antifreeze.

Waterless And Other Products

Evans "NPG+"TM (Non-Aqueous (water-free) propylene glycol), http://www.evanscooling.com/coolants/, (http://lubricationspecialist.com/front/showcontent.aspx?fileid=21&p=Evans) This is a more permanent waterless product. This is not a wetting agent. This product does not nucleate boil which is the formation of microscopic bubbles on metal surfaces that reduce heat transfer. The resulting operating temperature has been determined to be slightly higher than most glycol based products.

Maxima Cool Aide Coolant. This product is recommended for 2-cycle and 4-cycle liquid cooled engines, i.e. motorcycle race use. I found no recommendation for use in passenger cars.

Dexcool http://www.consumeraffairs.com/automotive/gm_dexcool.html. There is much negative discussion on chat sites about Dexcool by GM. Sounds like it is very corrosive and the rust flakes off, blocking radiators, etc.

Rodents Attack Treasures Stored (RATS)

Those cute cartoon characters that find their way into the hearts of little children and their parents alike are nothing like the real thing. Like Road Runner, they seem capable of escaping whatever we put in their way to capture or destroy the pesky little critters. And we end up experiencing the frustration, if not the fate, of a Wile E. Coyote.

Urban neighborhoods have been faced with rodent infestations for many years, but not eons.

Evidence from radiometric dating indicates that the Earth is about 4.570 billion years old. (Other estimates put the age of the earth closer to 6,000 years, but who is going to quibble about a few years more or less.) That age is divided into various times. The largest defined unit of time is the supereon, composed of eons. Eons are divided into eras, which are in turn divided into periods, epochs and ages. And while the current age is relatively new for the Earth, dealing with rodents is getting old fast for me.

Mammals appeared about 228 million years ago. Modern mammals appeared about 37 million years ago. The first rodents were not considered undesirable by people. That is because there were probably no people here to consider rodents more than two million years ago. But now there are definitely people, and rodents are definitely a problem.

When rodents invaded my yard a few years ago, I just flushed the garden hose down the rat holes and the rodents scampered to the neighbors' yards. Not a problem, for me. But last year they came back. And for the first time, they invaded two of my cars that were parked outside. They built nests and generally messed up the engine compartments. That was when I started to seriously look for ways to again make the neighbors' yards once more look more attractive than mine.

I am convinced that it is impossible to completely eliminate the pesky critters. Their tunnels know no boundaries. They can easily run away from my tactics. My efforts have to stop at the neighbor's property line. And when I tire of the battle, the clever little fellows come right back.

So the trick is to wage a continuing sustainable campaign against the little fellows without it being an all-consuming effort for me. Next time I will share some of the things that seem to work for me, and things that other people have tried.
