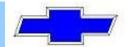

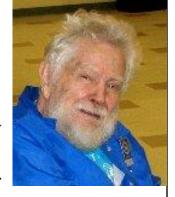

Chevrolee Comments...

on repairing, rebuilding, or replacing your Chevrolet engine

"It's a nice car, just has a little rod knock", is a phrase which was heard for several decades describing Chevrolets. By the mid 1950's however, crankshaft bearing failure was virtually eliminated by a series of changes in engine design over the years. Sometimes the changes were small, sometimes the changes were very significant, but they all added up to the smooth run-



ning engines with long life that we have known since the mid 1950's. Let us trace some of these changes.

The four cylinder engines were improved over the years climaxing in 1928 with the last of the early fours. For its time, this was an amazing engine, often outliving the car in which it came, only to find its way into a boat, a buzz saw rig, a tractor, or some other creative device. I believe that one of the reasons for success of this engine was the short crankshaft. With three main bearings, this means that there were two connecting rod journals between each main bearing.

In 1929 the six cylinder engines still had just three main bearings. This means that there are three connecting rod journals between each main bearing. This arrangement made the crankshaft somewhat "springy" and tended to lead to early bearing failure. The early 1929 engines did not have wrist pin bushings in the pistons. As a result, wrist pin noise was common. Late in 1929 this problem was corrected with the use of bronze bushings.

Up through 1928 the connecting rods did not have a separate removable dipper. A small "finger" was forged in the bottom of the rod cap which splashed through the oil in the trough. In 1929 the replaceable dipper was introduced with the basic design continuing through 1953.

The early four cylinder engines did not have continuous lubrication to the rocker arm shafts. A felt pad on top of the shafts was periodically given a few squirts of oil by the operator. If this was neglected, the shafts and valve guides wore and quickly became noisy. In 1929 continuous lubrication was provided.

The '51 Special Deluxe 2 door sedan showed up at the Portland Swap Meet in April 1985. A nephew brought the car to sell. It had 37,000 original miles and looked to be well cared for but needing a few things repaired and updated. I was given a phone number of Mrs. Maxine Davidson. When I called I learned she had inherited her uncle's car 10 years previously and didn't drive it much. Uncle Walt Feuerstein bought the car in Portland driving it to church on Sundays and to the grocery store. In about 1960 he moved to Warren. When Maxine began caring for the Chevy in 1969 she used it as a second car, taking it for drives when the weather permitted.

Most of the time was spent in a tiny one car garage. She had it serviced regularly and kept it clean. By 1985 a bit of rust was peeking from under the side trim and the bumpers were beginning to show signs of rust.

At this time Mrs. Davidson had a new car she wanted to keep in the garage but didn't want Walt's Chevy to sit outside and deteriorate further. We talked on the phone many times during the spring and summer and finally late in September she said I could come down and buy the car. When Sallie and I got there the Chevy was in the garage but ready to come home with us. After talking for some time and seeing pictures of the car we loaded it on a trailer and made the three-hour drive home talking excitedly about what we were planning for the car. Over the next year it got the trim removed, light rust cleaned, etched, primed and the whole car painted. We had Diane Hoyt repair the top of the rear seat and the shabby door panels. Our era as caretakers had begun.



We finally relinquished the car to a gentleman named Randy Markuson. For the next few years we saw the "Green Bean" at several car shows and approved of the care it was receiving. I hear Randy still has the car but he doesn't take it to shows as he finally has his new shop built and is finishing his hot rod.
