



#### Impala Lights Out

As you may recall, in 1990 my wife and I and my mother drove to Minneapolis, MN in my mother's 1966 Impala to attend my son's graduation from a two-year Bible college. We had just driven into the parking lot at the school in Minneapolis (actually Medicine Lake, just north of Minneapolis) and I had looked under the front of the car to see coolant dripping from the radiator.

We were about a half hour early for the graduation, so I told my wife and mother to walk in and I would see what I could do about the leak.

I put the pan under the radiator to catch the coolant, loosened the radiator cap to relieve the pressure, and contemplated the drip. I decided to let enough coolant out so that the drip stopped. Then I filled the core around the leak with silicone sealant, covered the sealant with paper, put more silicone over the paper, and ran wire through the core to hold the repair in place against pressure. Letting the silicone rubber harden, I went in to the graduation ceremony.

By the time the ceremony and reception were over, the rubber had hardened. I put the coolant in the pan back into the radiator, replaced the cap, and started the engine. As the engine came up to temperature I checked for a leak. No leak. I loosened the radiator cap just in case, betting that it would not overheat in the cool night air as we drove to our motel. I thought that the repair would probably last for the trip home, but decided to not take the chance.

The next day we found a radiator repair shop and had the radiator core replaced.

On the return trip, we had planned to stop and visit a friend on their family's 360-acre farm near Anselmo, Nebraska. We drove down from Minneapolis through Minnesota and Iowa farm country, then west into Nebraska and Anselmo.

At the farm, we followed people about the farm like kids on an outing. I drove the cultivator one day, giving our friend Shannon a chance to make some repairs to other equipment. We went to town to get more anhydrous ammonia to fertilize the corn. On the way back, the trailer nearly came loose. If it had gotten lose it could have killed us all. Leaking anhydrous ammonia can be deadly.

Then on another trip, the wheel came off of our friend's car that I was driving on a sandy farm road. The axle got stuck in the sand, and I learned how to shore up a jack in the sand using boards. The lug nuts had come

loose. I think my friend could have used another day to check farm equipment, including the cars.



Then at last, we headed home, going west out of Anselmo, through Nebraska and into Wyoming. After stopping for gas at a gas station in the middle of nowhere in Wyoming, we headed west into the sunset. We intended to eventually swing around to the north into Montana, then west again through the Idaho panhandle and into Washington and home.

As we headed west through Wyoming, the sun gradually set in front of us and we found ourselves alone on the blackened highway. I took a deep breath and leaned back to relax for the long trip ahead.

## Garage Floors and Moisture - Another Solution

I recently purchased the rubber floor covers from Costco. Seemed like the way to go. After they were down for a while I had an opportunity to lift one up. Guess what, I found moisture on the floor beneath the rubber liner. I quickly determined that the moisture was coming through the concrete floor in my garage. Concrete is porous. This is also the reason that Radon gas can come into houses through concrete floors. Now what do I do?

I researched on the web and found solutions that would penetrate concrete floors and fill the voids. These solutions are used to control porosity of concrete floors, thereby reducing the migration of moisture up through a concrete floor. I settled on RadonSeal, which is a deep-penetrating concrete sealer. Penetrates up to 4 inch deep. Works on new or old concrete, indoor or outdoor. This is suitable for paints and adhesives. This is a do-it-yourself product. It took one 5-gallon pail of sealer to finish the floor in my double garage. It is advertised online for \$149 per 5-gallon pail. This is a rather messy job and you have to keep moving quickly to complete it before it thickens up.

I have added a top finish and now I will test for moisture by laying down a piece of the rubber floor cover from Costco to see if it still collects moisture.

Give me a call if you have questions, or you can try the web at Radon Mitigation and Waterproofing Concrete Sealer (http://www.radonseal.com/radonseal-mitigation.htm).

If you are considering painting your garage floor, I encourage you to first test for moisture coming through the concrete floor. Take any type of rubber backed material like a rug with rubber backing, lay it on the garage floor for 4 to 5 days, then lift it up and check for moisture under it. If moisture is present, your floor is not ready for painting without first addressing the moisture problem. Almost always, this will draw out moisture, especially in older homes without a vapor barrier under a concrete garage floor.

Bob Stamnes also found vendors of similar sealing products at the home show recently. One claimed a penetration of 16 inches. I find this questionable.
