## Looking Back at Bill Damm's 1929 Coupe

After putting together some items related to the 1929 Chevy (see pages 7 and 12), and Model T and Model A Fords (see page 10), I found it interesting that Bill Damm's article in the December 2004 Tappet Clatter had some related commentary.

From the TC article, "Sometime around 1945 my mother had the car repainted solid green, bumpers too. I was barely old enough to remember going with my parents (in my father's 1930 Model A Ford) to pick up the car from the paint shop."

So it would seem that the 1929 Chevrolet Coupe was still a "ladies" car (just like the Chevrolet ads suggested). Bill's dad was driving a 1930 Ford Model A, rather than a Model T that had been serviced to keep it in tip top shape (as suggested in the advertising postcard on page 10).

Again from the December 2004 TC, "I believe the picture of my mother with her car is when she was driving back to Washington State, possibly via highway 99 when it was still a dirt road. The date on the back of the picture is December 16, 1930." It is obvious that the car meant a lot to Bill's mother, and it is wonderful that he has been able to restore the car and preserve the memories.

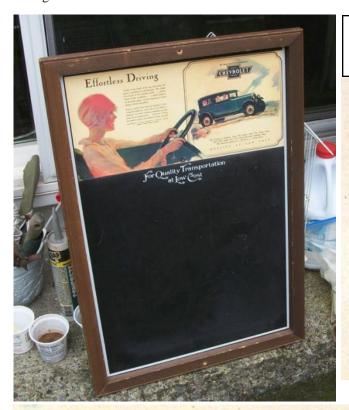


#### 1929 Chevrolet Chalkboard

I found what appears to be a piece of advertising for the 1929 line of Chevrolet cars at a second-hand store in Bothell last summer. I think I paid about \$10 for it. It was marked down for quick sale. The panel was loose from the frame, a problem easily fixed with some screws and washers on the backside. I was surprised to find prices listed for each car model.

The effortless driving attributes of the 1929 Chevrolet are touted in the picture of the "modern" lady driving. See the enlargements of the text below.

And no matter how long the journey or how varied the highway, every mile at the wheel is a pleasure—for there's perfect roadability at every point on the speedometer . . . and there's always the restful comfort that Body by Fisher assures!

How does that "effortless driving" claim compare with what present-day owner's experience on tours? And do the ladies still drive their convertibles while wearing their finest fashions?

Advertised as a six cylinder for the price of a four, it was also known as the "Cast Iron Wonder" for its cast iron pistons and the "Stovebolt Six" for its slotted quarter-inch head bolts. The car was non-the-less considered an improvement over the 1928 model.

#### Winter Is Here. Is It Too Late To Winterize? NO WAY!

Your old car is asking for a little love. If your car is not winterized one way or another, it cannot be expected to perform well on next spring's tours.

How you winterize your car will depend upon your storage conditions, your energy level, and the length of time you plan to store the car. You can do a full-blown winterization with wheels off, battery out, fuel system treated, etc. or you can do the minimum and start the car every couple of weeks to a month and roll it out of the garage and run it hot for 15 or more minutes to circulate fluids and rotate the bearings. Either way, you will want to protect the radiator against freezing, protect the car against rodent infestation, keep the fuel tank full to avoid condensation, and possibly stabilize the fuel, especially if you have fuel with Ethanol. (NOTE: The website for finding fuel without ethanol is pure-gas.org.)

The following discussion addresses what can be done if you are going to do a full-blown winterization. The basic steps are: (1) rodent control, (2) cooling system service, (3) battery service, and (4) fuel system service.

Rodent control is essential and should include ridding them from the building and the car. There are many aspects to this. The first line of defense is keeping the critters out of the building. The second line of defense is addressing the car itself. Taking the wheels off and blocking it up on jack stands eliminates the ability for rodents to gain access by climbing the tires. This also takes the weight off the tires eliminating the potential for flat spots on the tires. Rodent access into and between compartments of the car can by addressed by stuffing steel wool into small potential access points. Some say Strawberry Air Fresheners and WD 40 repel mice. Others suggest mothballs in and around the car. Leave the hood open to let light into the engine compartment. Rodents like it dark. Removal of food particles and food odors by vacuuming, etc. may also help. It is always good to periodically check the building and the car for signs of rodents. I set mousetraps in my garage and replace the bait every couple of weeks.

The cooling system should be checked for adequate antifreeze. This is especially important if the car is open to the elements. We have not had a hard freeze yet this year, but it could happen at any time. Remember to run the car in a well-ventilated area (outside) to circulate any added antifreeze. This is also a great time to add water pump lubricant and corrosion inhibitor if antifreeze is not used.

Batteries deserve special handling if left to sit for an extensive time, especially if in the cold. If the car is stored in the cold, it may be worth removing the battery from the car and storing it in a warm area. Charge the battery with a battery charger. If charging does not go to zero within a day or so, your battery may need replacing. If charging goes to zero in a reasonable time, store it on some quarter-inch plywood or 2 x 4s to insulate it from a concrete floor. A float charger can be used for the long-term to maintain a full charge.

Keeping the fuel tank full will reduce the accumulation of moisture from condensation. If the tank is not kept full, you may want to use a gasoline additive to absorb moisture. In either case, a gas stabilizer can be added to maintain the quality of the fuel and reduce varnish buildup. Note that the engine should be operated after adding any additive so the product is circulated though the systems.

Doing all of the above may be ideal. However, turning over the engine and rolling the car back and forth is better than letting it just sit. It is also beneficial to drive the car periodically, keeping the engine temperature up for a few minutes.

If you plan to store your car for longer periods, you may wish to add a slight bit of oil or Marvel Mystery Oil in the cylinders, and then crank the car over without starting it to coat the cylinders and rings. You can also spray a little WD 40 under the distributor cap to absorb moisture in the distributor.

If you plan to store the car for a short time, and lack the energy for a full-blown winterization, or store the car in a temperature controlled environment, you should still start the car every couple of weeks to a month and roll it out of the garage

and run it hot for 15 or more minutes to circulate fluids and rotate the bearings.

Winter, when you have no tours, is a great time to do some maintenance on your car. You may wish to inspect the electrical system, including, all starter cable connections, lights, wiring, and fan belt. It is also a great time to lube the car and change oil.

The list of maintenance items from last summer's tours is the next important thing to address. You want to be ready to go for the next tour season.

### Keeping That Old Ford Running

Shown below is the back of a penny postcard mailed to Chester Bjorngaard of Bottineau, North Dakota. It is dated June 29, 1928. A while back, Al Howe sent this clipping to the Tappet Clatter. Even though it relates directly to the Ford Model T, it is still interesting to see what Chevrolet was up against at the time.

The Model A was manufactured between 1928 and 1931. This note was probably from a dealership, service station or garage, but I have not found complete information on the C. R. Gleason Co. of Bottineau, N. Dak. The company was sold to Theel Motors in 1957. Latest information is that they now sell Chevrolets and Buicks.

It would seem that a well-kept Model T could be maintained for much less than the cost of a new car.

I wonder how these cost would compare to similar service for a Chevy in 1928?

It's still as good a car as it was the day the new Model A Ford was announced and there's no need to sacrifice it.

The Model T Ford is still used by more people than any other automobile. Eight million are in active service right now and many of them can be driven one, two, three and five years and even longer.

Bring your car to us and let us look it over. You'll be surprised to see how

little it costs to put it in tip-top shape.

New fenders, for instance, cost from \$3.50 to \$5.00 each, with a labor charge of \$1.00 to \$2.50. Tuning up the motor and replacing commutator case, brush and vibrator points costs only \$1.00, with a small charge for material. Brake shoes can be installed and emergency brakes equalized for a labor charge of only \$1.25. A labor charge of \$4.00 to \$5.00 will cover the overhauling of the front axle, rebushing springs and spring perches, and straightening, aligning and adjusting wheels.

The labor charge for overhauling the average rear axle runs from \$5.75 to \$7.00. Grinding valves and cleaning carbon can be done for \$3.00 to \$4.00.

A set of four new pistons and rings cost only \$7.00. For a labor charge of \$20 to \$25.00 you can have your motor and transmission completely overhauled. Parts
