A New Year is here So let's do things right Be conscious of safety Both day and at night.


Make sure doors are not blocked And hallways are clear So all can escape From fire in fear.



Coils Part 2 WHAT COIL SHOULD BE IN YOUR CAR? --- The history of coils

A discussion of coils started at a garage night at Dick Olson's. One conclusion that night was that 4 cylinder coils produced roughly the same spark if they had a condenser attached to them or not. But people were also of the opinion that these old coils had no condensers, so why would the spark be the same? One thing led to the other and after much discussion between Dave Folsom, Lee Folsom, Bob Stamnes and Jim Farris, Dave Folsom did some bench testing and tore apart a couple of coils. A void inside the coil that ran from top to bottom on one side was found in a coil that was labeled "NO CONDENSER". Dave tore apart another coil and discovered the condenser was in that same location, convincing us that coils were made with and without condensers. Those without condensers were likely made for other car manufacturers, as Chevrolets used only coils with condensers. Dave and Jim also assembled most of the coils from the early 4 cylinder cars up through the 1950s. The following discussion is the result of these efforts. We will first discuss the history and then present a description and photos of the appropriate coil for each year.

The ignition system involves a resister, a condenser (also known as a capacitor), a coil, points and dual points in later years. The 6 volt system was used through 1954, when Chevrolet started using a 12 volt system, which turned the engines over faster making for easier starts. All ignition systems included a resister except 1929 through 1954. These resisters reduced the voltage seen by the points and reduced point burn and in the early cars (1928 and earlier) saved the points when the switch was left on for longer periods while hand starting these cars. The early cars had no voltage regulator, making starting by electric starter less dependable, which led to the hand cranking. The early coils (pre 1929) had a resister on the top of them. Ignition systems in 1929 through 1954 had no resisters. Starting in 1955, when they went to a 12 volt system, they mounted a ballaster resister (or dropping resister) on the fire wall. In about 1960 they started using a resister wire in place of the ballast resister. In about 1975, auto manufacturers replaced the points with a magnetic controlled module. These cars still had a coil, but were without a resister. The inclusion of a resister commonly knocked the voltage down on 12 volt systems during normal operation (except during starting), which protected the points and made for better starting with full voltage during starting. One question that came up during garage night at Dave Folsom's was the use of 12 volt coils on 6 volt systems. It was concluded that a 12 volt coil works just fine. Capacitors generally improve the spark, so a common problem of not being able to start your car can be a bad capacitor, which results in little or no spark. (continued page 9)

1918-1919 This coil is fat with paper on the outside. All identification marks are obliterated. It is assumed to be a Remy 287 B used on 1918-1919 Four Ninety's. This one came off a 1919. It has two top connectors and a knob for a spade type connector on the side. There are two bolts on the outside that hold the top and base together. There is no resister on the top.

1920-1927 This coil is fat with a knob on the side. This is a 284 K used in years 1920 through early 1927. It has two top connectors. One top contact is connected to a resistor in a round housing on top of the coil. There is a spade type connector on the side for the wire that goes to the center of the distributor. There is a bolt through the middle of coil that holds top and bottom together. The bolt is soldered to the base place at the bottom.

1927-1928 This is a 284W coil for late 1927 through 1928 cars. This is a fat coil with a molded terminal connection on the side that accepts a distributor type wire end. It appears similar to the 1920-1927 coil described above, except the side connection is a distributor type wire connection.

1929-1932 This is a thinner coil with a brass band around the top. This is a Delco Remy coil used on Chevrolets 1929 through 1932. This coil has a brass ring just down from top. It has two bolt type connectors on top and one of these is of a distributor type wire connector. The mounting bracket goes around the coil and is welded to the coil.

1933-1940 (*left page 8*) This coil is for years 1933 through 1940. The coil shown is thought to be a 1935 Standard. This coil has a bottom cap, one bolt type top terminal and one distributor type top connector. The mounting bracket goes around the coil and is welded to the coil. This coil has a cap on its base with a conduit attached that houses wires that go to the ignition switch (an electrolock, antitheft device).

1941-1946 (center page 8) This coil is thin with a white insulator on the bottom. This coil is for years 1941 through 1946. The top has two bolt type terminals. One of these terminals has a mounting base for the electrolock conduit that runs to the ignition switch. The electrolock cover is a smaller cover than the type used on the 1933-1940 coil described above. The male high voltage spark plug type connector on the bottom is in the middle of the white porcelain insulator. Mounting bracket wraps around the coil and is welded to the coil. Chevrolet also used the smaller 10 millimeter spark plug and dual points in these years.

1947-1954(*right page 8*) This is a modern 6 volt Delco coil used on Chevrolets 1947 through 1954. The 12 volt coil that came into use in 1955 is identical in appearance. These coils are thin with two bolt type terminals on top and one distributor type connector on top. There is no mounting bracket attached to the coil.

Much credit is given to Dave and Lee Folsom for their persistence in getting to the bottom of this issue, and to Jim Farris for his great effort in documenting coils by year.
