Christmas Comes to Comstock's but Santa Skipped the Sleigh!






Meanwhile in the house, the ladies gathered around the kitchen to sip a little wine, sample cheese, crackers and a ter-

Our family had not had an auto since my dad died in 1943, when my Mom sold our 1933 Dodge. I had found that the bus took care of my getting to work, so I did not really need a car. But I did go out with a couple of fellows who let me steer from the passenger side and I began to think it would be nice to have my own car. By this time I had graduated from high school and was working as bookkeeper at the National Bank of Commerce in Seattle. The interesting part of this story is that I did not yet know how to drive.

I began thinking I would like a Chevrolet, and maybe I would take a trip back to Detroit to pick up my 1950 Chev. In the meantime my uncle who had a Ford, pardon the expression, offered the suggestion that a Studebaker was a good quality car, and I could get it right here in Seattle.

I cannot remember how I managed to think I could drive, must have had a tiny bit of information, but



with my Mom's financial help, I purchased a new 1950 Studebaker. It had 11 miles on it. I am sure my Mom was the most patient person alive, as, although she offered to drive it home. I refused that offer. So...all of the way home, we jerked and hesitated, while my Mom kept offering to drive. We did make it, and I am sure that if she had not already had premature gray hair, I would have caused it to rapidly become that color!

Then my uncle stepped in and said that his insurance would not allow him to teach me to drive with his car. But he would be happy to teach me on my car. So, with a mighty patient uncle, I did learn to drive well enough to get my drivers permit.

I found that I was very happy with the "hill holder" which served me well on the hills of Seattle. My first experience with it was when I was on my way to a wedding, and half way up a steep hill, I found that it was a "life saver" for me. I always remember with pleasure that special item!

Then my Mom and I decided to take a trip. So off we went to California, Grand Canyon, Bryce Canyon, etc. It was a such a nice trip, and by the last leg of it, I glanced at my Mom, who was peacefully sleeping. I asked her how she could be so sure that I did not need her watchful eyes. She replied "you are a good driver". I remember going through a town that was having a parade, and we "inched our way though it". She encouraged me, saying that I did well, through that experience. It was a wonderful trip and upon our return, I

immediately went to get my drivers license. Passed with "flying col-

ors". I found great pleasure in my driving.

That winter I was going to the college age group at church, and we had a Sing-along after church. When we came out after the evening service, I found that the snow was falling. "Oh Dear, what to do?" Then a friend said, "I come from the Midwest, and have been driving in snow all my life. Just do what I tell you, and you will be fine." She was right. We went to the singing, and I got home safe and sound afterwards.



I enjoyed my Studebaker, until I met Lee, and of course he drove a 1947 Chevrolet. We drove the Studebaker on our honeymoon, but ever since then, I too have been driving Chevys.

Since I had not made many payments to my Mom, it returned to her. My 3 sisters all learned to drive on the Studebaker. It served them for quite a long time.

I always look back with much pleasure to my owning my own car, even though it was a Studebaker.

Diagnosing a Car that is Pulling to One Side

I was at Dave Folsom's shop looking after MG's '53 Chevrolet when Dave was trying to figure out why a 1954 Chevrolet pickup was pulling to the left while braking.

Here, Dave explains in his own words the process he went through to find the culprits.

In test driving this truck I found that on light to medium stops, the rear of the truck would shift to the right which would cause the truck to pull to the left. On hard stops the left rear wheel would lock up. Starting with the left rear brake drum I found it to be badly rust pitted. After replacing the drum I found no difference in the problem.

Next I replaced the rear brake shoes as one of the shoe's linings on the left side was cracked. In doing so this allowed both rear wheels to skid evenly; this was encouraging but the pulling still persisted.

With the rear brakes functioning properly I shifted my attention to the front brakes. First I checked the left front brake and found the primary and secondary shoes were reversed. This had to be it! Just to be sure I checked the right front shoes and found they were also on backwards. Since both side's shoes were installed backwards they were at least matched side to side so most likely this wasn't going to solve the problem. I installed the front shoes in their correct positions and took the truck for a test drive. As suspected still no change in the pulling, but it was good I found the shoes were on backwards. This will help the truck stop better with the shoes installed correctly.

Continuing to troubleshoot, I blocked off the lines to the rear brakes, (this would take the rear brakes completely out of the equation), and took the truck for a test drive, it still pulled left. This ruled out that the rear brakes were part of the continuing pulling problem.

Now concentrating on the front I swapped the brake drums left to right, because I had taken note that the right drum had been turned slightly larger than the left giving those shoes slightly less surface contact with the drum. The test drive showed no change in the pulling problem.

I then checked the right front brake hose for blockage; it was clear. Bob happened to stop by at this time so I had him step on the brake pedal as I watched the right front brake line. Fluid came through the line with ease. There was only one thing left it could be, and I did not suspect these as they were freshly painted silver. I pulled the right front wheel cylinder and found one of the two pistons stuck solid. Ah HA! Success! In the end I found that both front cylinders were also rust pitted. I replaced both cylinders with new ones, and the truck now stops straight.

The thing that threw me is that when there is a front brake problem, like fluid leaking onto the shoes, there is normally a more violent pull to one side. This truck only had a light to medium pull, depending on how hard you were stopping. Also the fact that the brake cylinders were so nicely painted I assumed they had recently been rebuilt. I was relieved to have finally found the problem and that the truck was race ready.

GARAGE NIGHT

WASHINGTON STATE DEPARTMENT OF LICENSING

7-year plate replacement no longer mandatory as of Jan. 1

The Washington state law that requires vehicle owners to buy new license plates after seven years is being rescinded in favor of letting owners keep their plates for as long as they want.

Under current law, an owner has to pay \$24 to buy a new license plate in the seventh year of registration of the same car. Starting Jan. 1, owners will be able to keep their plates even when they buy a new vehicle,

Under the new law, a new plate is required only when it's lost, defaced, illegible or when the vehicle is sold to a new owner. The seller has the option of keeping their old plate and transferring it to another vehicle for a \$10 fee. Also, if the vehicle title is transferred within a family with no money being exchanged, the new owner can keep the same plate.
