





with paper towel wrapped around it that had a slight bit of thinner on it. This was tedious but worked well using a continuous smooth motion from where you start, moving it along the edge of the letter to where there was no more green on the background. Q-tips might work real well also. This Formica process worked so well and was quite fast compared to using a rubbing/polishing compound, that I continued this process on the other letters with the same piece of Formica. I also applied this same method to the "WASHINGTON" at the bottom of the license plate, doing a few letters of "Washington" at a time. I did have a slight problem with the Formica slipping slightly when I pressed on it while on a letter. This caused more green paint to be laid on one side of the letter. Thickening the paint should reduce this problem.

So MG's car now has a restored license plate with two coats of white gloss epoxy appliance paint and green letters painted with a heavier coat of "Sign Painters 1-SHOT Lettering Enamel", which Don suggested using (see picture.)

Much appreciation goes to Don Comstock and Bill Barker for responding to my inquiry at the club meeting.

Puget Sound Region VCCA General Meeting Minutes May 22, 2017

<u>Call to Order</u>: The meeting was called to order at the Issaquah IHOP Restaurant by Co-Director Jerry Brownell at 7:28 pm. The meeting began with Jerry updating the group on his knowledge of Rod Schein's recent heart surgery. His surgery went well according to the family and it was reported that Rod is out of the hospital and recuperating at an inpatient physical therapy facility. Jerry also commented that this was our first meeting at the IHOP and asked those in attendance if anyone had traffic issues getting to the new location. The consensus was that traffic was OK but may have been good because of the good weather. Jerry also asked members how it was working to have the Tappet Clatter delivered by email instead of hard copy. Al Howe noted that only four members did not have access to email and they were still getting hard copy. Members appeared pleased with the change. Twenty-eight members and guests were present.

Membership: Donna Onat introduced new member Ed Laster and commented that Don Hatley had brought a friend/guest with him, Mike Briese.

<u>Minutes:</u> Minutes for the April meeting, as published in the May Tappet Clatter were approved by vote of those present.

<u>Treasurer Report:</u> Sallie Comstock reported that the treasury is healthy especially without the monthly expense of the Tappet Clatter printing costs. She also commented that the treasury was increased by \$620 thanks to those that volunteered to help out at the Monroe Swap Meet.

Activities/Tours: Don Comstock started the discussion by thanking each member who participated in the Monroe Swap Meet. He felt the Meet went well and members did a good job of manning the Vendor Gate and controlling the flow. Don mentioned that we have a full plate of activities starting in July but that we could use something in June. He mentioned that we could participate in the GM Picnic on Father's Day or that members could do that on their own. Starting in July, club activities for the summer include the 4th of July Picnic at the Haddock's, the Hood River Oregon WAAAM Car Show July 7th and 8th, and the PSR-VCCA 50th Anniversary Party on July 15th at Jerry Yoder's home. As a special incentive to get members to attend the Anniversary Party, Don and Sallie have obtained original Puget Sound Region-VCCA Posters (circa 1970) done by former Director Mike Burns and will be raffling off two posters at the party. Don mentioned that in August we have the Northwest Meet in Anacortes and asked Ken Scott to talk about it. Ken stated that he is assisting again with judging and asked all members to consider getting their cars judged at the meet. He mentioned that there are many categories of judging including some that are easy to qualify for an oval and encouraged members to find one category that suites them. Don also mentioned the SeaTac HCCA Annual Car Show at the Ballard Locks to be held on August 12th. This is the 100th Centennial for the Ballard Locks and they are hoping to get a large classic car turnout. Don had information on several of these events that he left for members to review or take with them if they were interested. Dave Haddock completed the discussion of activities citing the good turnout for the Ballard Parade and thanking Bob Stamnes and the Schein family for their efforts in making this another memorable event.

<u>Glove Box:</u> Bob Stamnes asked members to bring up topics for him to cover or ask questions for new articles.

<u>National News:</u> Bill Barker gave an update from the recent National Board Meeting. He stated that the Member Services contractor selection has occurred and a vendor has been retained to take over this part of the club business beginning later this summer. He stated that there have been a number of issues related to the changeover that are taking some time to resolve. He said that a vote has taken place and that Bowling Green, Kentucky has been selected as the site for the next Anniversary Meet and that the newly elected President of the club is Jim Gephardt. Bill also volunteered to host a "Garage Night" in his garage on June 14th. He said to show up around 6:30 or 7 PM and that he will be giving away some items by raffle at 8 PM.

<u>Meeting Presentation</u>: Bob Stamnes gave a presentation on how to restore "year of manufacture" license plates using a license plate he recently restored for MG Stamnes' 1953 Chevy. His methods, tips, and tricks will be presented in the Glove Box column in the June 2017 edition of the Tappet Clatter.

From the Glove Box

LICENES PLATE RESTORATION

MG's '53 Chevrolet license plate always looked pretty bad. It looked like the background was rusty. Now that the car seems to run pretty good, it was time to address some of these little things. Little things? A license plate?

Bill Barker sent me a list of websites that show videos and discuss methods of restoring license plates. Don Comstock also provided information on what paint to use and a warning on how tough it is to paint the letters. I really appreciate this information and have provided the websites at the end of this article. One of the sites provided by Bill was about Washington State law. This is a very inclusive website and should be read before starting your license plate restoration. This site requires you to check in with the DMV.

The first step in the license plate restoration process is acquiring a flat license plate of the appropriate year. If you do not start with a flat license plate, you may find it difficult to flatten the one you have, but according to the articles, the best way is to use your hands to flatten your license plate. I was lucky that the license plate for MG's '53 was pretty flat. Once you have a fairly flat license plate, it is time to take the nicks and creases out of it. There is a pretty good video that shows the use of a Papa Dent tool (www.papadent.com) using several different bits (chisel, mushroom, pointed, and round) at Https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=jeUyCfpnQxc. You can probably find similar shapes around your shop, which will work well with a light tap of a hammer, using a piece of metal as backing (like an anvil).

The next step is to remove the old paint. This can be done, by media blasting, paint removal solution, or sanding. I sand blasted our license plate, but I would probably use paint remover, or a less harsh media blasting next time. Sand blasting left some pitting. Sanding may affect definition of the letters and could be difficult in small areas. Much of the pitting from sand blasting was filled by multiple coats of paint. Now you have a clean license plate ready to paint. There are many types of paint and the one you use may depend upon your experience and how the car will be used, or stored. I used a rattle can primer, but one of the references suggests using an etching primer. I then tried several approaches outlined in references and discussed by Don. The '53 license plate should be a white background with green lettering. I found a 27 license plate that required a lot of work, but the letters were good enough to try different approaches. I tried painting the front of the plate green and then white, then sanding off the white on the letters to leave green letters. I also tried removing the white using a rubbing compound to leave green letters. I found that unless the letters are perfectly flat, which they were not in my case, you will be left with some white in the low spots on the letters. This was unacceptable to me. I also found that removing the white with rubbing compound was extremely slow. I tried to remove the white over the letters with paint thinner, which also proved difficult to get a good paint-to-paint line. So the next thing I tried was to paint the entire plate the back ground color (white) and brushing on the green with a small foam brush. This proved impossible as I had paint on the letters and on the back ground and the transition from letters to background were not uniform, but irregular.

I had to find something that worked and was simple. One article discussed how lettering paint on original license plates was done by rollers, similar to a printing press. So I thought something like this on a much smaller scale might work. I tried using a pad that you paint corners of a room with. This had enough fine hairs on it that the green paint ended up on the white back ground.

So I tried to find something without the hairs. I tried to find a pad as large as the license plate at an art store, thinking that I may be able to put green paint on the pad and then lay the license plate face down on the pad to apply the green. I could not find such a thing, but an art major in the shop suggested thickening the paint by leaving it on cardboard for a few minutes before applying it to a pad to transfer it to the license plate. So, when I got home, I pulled out an old sheet of Formica and cut off a piece the side of a single letter (see photo). I spread #148, Dark Green, Sign Painters' 1-SHOT Lettering Enamel, that Don had suggested, evenly on the front side of the Formica. 1-SHOT can be found in art stores. I held this with a finger on each end of the Formica, turned it over with paint down and applied it to a letter on the license plate, pushing down gently so it would contact the entire letter. This method gave very even, smooth and continuous edges to the paint on the edge of the letter. TaDa!!!!! I filled in the center of the letter as needed using a small foam brush. I



did not thicken the paint on cardboard before use, but I should have, as less green would have reached the background area of the license plate.

Because I did not thicken the paint, I had some final touch up along the edges where the paint was too liquid and went onto the back ground of the plate. I cleaned these areas with a fairly sharp pointed object, like that of a file handle without the wood,


