Chevrolee Comments...

on repairing, rebuilding, or replacing your Chevrolet engine

Last month I pointed out some steps backwards and some steps forward in the refining process of the Chevrolet engine. The six cylinder, three main bearing crankshaft of 1929 was probably less reliable than the four cylinder, three main bearing crankshaft of the previous years. The absence of piston/pin bush-



ings in the early 1929 models was corrected by the inclusion of bushings later in the year. The big improvement was the provision of continuous lubrication to the rocker arm shafts.

The changes in 1930 were rather small. The crankshaft was made slightly heavier and the cylinder head was re-designed. In 1929 the intake and exhaust valves were the same size. In 1930 the size of the exhaust valves was reduced and the size of the intake valves was increased. The 1930 exhaust valve size was reduced because these valves do not need to be very large since piston pressure forces the exhaust gasses out. The intake valve size was increased to provide better induction into the cylinders, since in this case we rely on atmospheric pressure to force air-fuel mixture into the cylinders. The result was a smoother and more powerful engine.

The 1931 engine was almost identical to the 1930 engine. One improvement was the inclusion of stiffening ribs on the cylinder block. 1932 saw a number of improvements in engine design. The weight of the crankshaft was again increased. The main and cam shaft bearings now received pressure lubrication, (on previous years spray from the crankcase was collected in reservoirs and the oil collected ran down to these bearings). The connecting rods were improved to reduce side-play. The W-1 Carter downdraft carburetor was introduced. The intake manifold throat diameter was increased. The compression ratio was increased. A manually controlled heat riser was provided in the exhaust manifold, and the engine was now supported by rubber mounts providing smoother operation.


We are planning for Saturday, April 23 with a rainy day backup of April 30.


