Without their hard work the Rendezvous would not have happened. We had just over one hundred registrations, a little short of two hundred people and just fewer than one hundred cars.

Puget Sound Region received the Regional Vehicle Participation award and the Regional Member Participation award. Only three people wore vintage clothes to the banquet.

I had to change the carburetor on my 1931, and for a while I thought I was going to be the only one who had to work on their car. But there were others. Most got repaired and finished the tours.
